



Hebron Festival Brings Memories and Moonlight

On a warm autumn afternoon, part of Route 66 transformed into a glowing patchwork of laughter, color and creativity for Hebron's annual Harvest Moon Festival. The scent of kettle corn and freshly baked pizza drifted through the air as children in costume darted between scarecrow displays, parents browsed the rows of local artisan tents and live music echoed across the grounds.

Now in its ninth year, the festival – which was held last Saturday, Oct. 18 – has become a cherished seasonal tradition, hosted by the Town Center Project, Inc. – a nonprofit powered entirely by volunteers. Co-president Holly Habicht said the event's roots go back to one resident's determination to bring more "spunk" to Hebron life.

"One individual in 2017 decided that Hebron needed a little bit more spunk, if you will," Habicht explained. "We needed more things to do, more things to eat, more things to see. And she wrangled up a group of business people and civic-minded residents and they formed The Town Center Project."

That early collaboration led to a series of community events, from concerts to markets - but none quite captures Hebron's heart like the Harvest Moon Festival. This year's gathering drew around 2,000 people, according to Habicht.

"We were happy with the attendance," she said. "We felt that a lot of them were community members...which made us happy."

As the golden light of early evening fell across the festival, vendors welcomed visitors with everything from handcrafted pottery to mystical

herbs and homegrown magic. Constance Duffy, owner of Ms. Duffy's Magick Workshop, said it was her first year participating. Her booth shimmered with bundles of dried mugwort and sachets filled with flowers and herbs – each

made, she said, in a "really good mood" and "extra-charged with positivity."

"I started looking at magical properties of different things that I already have in my yard, and then I started creating the mugwort sticks,"

Duffy said. "I love mugwort. ... I incorporate other things from my yard with mugwort."

From sachets to fairy garden seed blends, Duffy's creations reflected her belief that each item carries intention and energy.

"When I make things, I make sure that I'm in a really good mood," she said. "I've got my iHeartRadio classic funk going, I got the jams. So everything is extra-charged with positivity and good things for you."

Nearby, festivalgoers lingered at another booth that caught nearly everyone's attention – Gravesteins, a display of pottery imprinted with designs from historic gravestones. Artist Jamie Fitzgerald of Hebron described her work as both a preservation of art and of history.

"These are handmade pottery pieces that are made with impressions of actual gravestones from graveyards from the local area," Fitzgerald said. "We make a clay impression of the gravestone carving, and then we handmade each individual piece of pottery from our impression that we make."

She said the project began from her fascination with the intricate designs found on old New England headstones.

"I just love the art, the carvings," Fitzgerald said. "And it's a nice way to preserve the art and also for history's sake."

The gravestone pottery line has quickly become one of her most talked-about collections, perfectly in tune with the festival's autumnal and slightly spooky atmosphere.

"There's a lot of cemetery enthusiasts," Fitzgerald added with a laugh. "So it's nice to get

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Rescued Horses Healing in East Hampton

A team of East Hampton volunteer horse rescuers is celebrating the progress of a group of horses that were rescued from a property in Willimantic in June.

The group of seven draft horses, a mule and two miniature donkeys have been recovering at Connecticut Draft Horse Rescue's farm in East Hampton.

Volunteer and farm manager Stacey Randall said she was there when the horses arrived.

"It was heartbreaking to say the least," she said. "The majority of their hoofs were in awful condition. They were cracked. They looked like flippers. They were severely overgrown. The weight on most of them was very bad. Their manes were disgusting and knotted. We had to shave a couple because they were so matted and they had lice."

Randall said that some of the injuries weren't just physical, but emotional, stemming from long periods of neglect. She described most of the horses as "checked out," and not trusting of humans.

The horses and donkeys were seized in

June following a Windham Animal Control investigation resulting from a tip made by a concerned citizen in May. Willimantic police arrested the owners recently and charged them with 11 counts of animal cruelty, but the court case to determine the horses' custody has not yet been decided. If the court does grant custody to the town of Windham, the town would likely then grant custody to Connecticut Draft Horse Rescue, and the horses would then eventually be adopted out.

Randall said Connecticut Draft Horse Rescue was founded in 2011 by veterinarian Dr. Stacey Golub, following the rescue of a Clydesdale named Autumn from a slaughterhouse auction. Since then, Randall said the organization has rescued over 160 horses. Some are surrendered by owners who can no longer care for their animals, others are pulled from auction, and still others are seized by animal control authorities, who then turn to the rescue organization for help while court cases proceed.

"Our ultimate goal is to rescue, rehabilitate, and rehome," said Randall.

Randall herself has been with the organization since nearly the beginning, joining in 2011 after her mom saw an ad in this paper mentioning that a new horse rescue was looking for volunteers. Randall said she's always been a horse person and grew up having horses, though she didn't have any of her own at the time. The job has since turned into a full-time volunteer role for her as the Farm Manager.

These days, the horses rescued in Willimantic are healing. They received comprehensive veterinary care immediately upon arriving at the farm, and they are thriving.

"They've all gained between 200 and just about 400 pounds," said Randall. "Their coats are nice and shiny. They've seen the farrier three times at this point, so they are really just living the dream now."

There have even been some surprises at the farm, she said.

"We ended up finding out the two mares that we rescued were pregnant," Randall said. "Judging by signs that we can see, we think

On Saturday, Oct. 25, from 1-3 p.m., join the Palmer-Warner House, a Connecticut Landmarks museum, for “Following Death: Cemetery Walk & Talk” Explore the burial customs, traditions, and superstitions around death in the region from colonial times through the 19th century during a presentation led by Dean Massey, an urban planning researcher at Northeastern University.

Following Massey’s talk, a short walk to the Warner Cemetery will offer participants the opportunity to examine epitaphs and iconography, as well as engage in a discussion about the rich diversity of New England’s remembrance practices.

Massey led “Following Death” last year and was also part of the Palmer-Warner House’s “Queer Independence Discussion Panel” in June. Massey lives in Providence, R.I., but grew up in Connecticut, studied at Connecticut College, and worked at the Connecticut General Assembly.

Tickets for “Following Death: Cemetery Walk & Talk” are \$10 per person or \$5 per Connecticut Landmarks Member. Purchase tickets at ctlandmarks.org/followingdeath.

Tours of the Palmer-Warner House will also be available during the event, between 1 p.m. and 4 p.m., with the last tour starting at 3 p.m.

The Palmer-Warner House has quite the storied history. It was built by John and Mehitabel (Chapman Richardson) Warner in 1738. Later generations of the Warner family would become blacksmiths, and many of their pieces were collected by previous resident Frederic Palmer and can be seen throughout the house today.

A visit to the site includes a behind-the-scenes tour in which guests can learn about the collection of personal diaries and photos used to reconstruct the lives of Frederic Palmer and Howard Metzger, providing an opportunity to discuss society’s impact on the thoughts and actions of the house’s former residents.

Tour tickets for Oct. 25 cost \$16 per person; \$12 per senior, student, or teacher; \$5 per child age 6-18; and free for Connecticut Landmarks members as well as children under 6. Tickets may be purchased at www.ct-landmarks.org/palmer.

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Town Admin Resigns Amid Board ‘Chaos’

Town Administrator Eric Anderson has confirmed that he will be resigning from his position in Andover to accept a new role as town manager in Dalton, Mass.

Anderson, who has served Andover since 2019, cited growing difficulties with the Board of Selectmen as a significant factor in his decision to leave.

Anderson submitted his formal resignation on Oct. 15 and stated that the Board of Selectmen is expected to meet soon to discuss the matter.

“As far as I understand, they have a meeting scheduled for [Oct. 24] to discuss [the resignation] and potentially come to a resolution on an interim town manager,” he said.

He added that the decision on how to act will ultimately rest with the board.

“That is up to the Board of Selectmen how they want to proceed, but certainly, I would recommend that they hire an interim director,” he said.

When asked what led to his departure, Anderson acknowledged ongoing difficulties with the town’s leadership.

“The Board of Selectmen has been difficult to deal with for a while,” he shared. “That’s a strong part of the reason why I’m leaving.”

He described the source of that difficulty as stemming from personnel changes within the board itself – upheaval that dates back more than a year.

In August 2024, Republican selectman Paula King submitted her resignation, leaving the board with only four members, and just one Republican. Her departure led to a protracted process of finding a replacement, as selectmen just could not agree on who should fill the role. The months-long stalemate finally ended this past April, when Republican Carol Lee, Andover’s longtime town clerk, was sworn in to fill King’s seat.

Anderson could not offer specific solutions for improving the board’s working relationship.

“If I thought that they could fix it, I would have stayed,” he said.

Despite the challenges, Anderson reflected positively on his time in Andover and highlighted several accomplishments during his time as town administrator.

“Mostly it’s been good,” he said. “I’ve enjoyed my tenure here, and I feel like I accomplished a lot for the town.”

As examples of those accomplishments, Anderson pointed to a series of successful infrastructure and community projects completed or underway.

“We’ve been very successful in getting grant funding to finish off a lot of the projects that the town really wanted,” Anderson said. “We got a community center built. We had a really good [Department of Transportation] connectivity grant series of projects that worked very well for the town. We got the replacement of the Bun-

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ker Hill Bridge fully funded, and that is being replaced right now and should be done around December 1. We have the Long Hill Bridge scheduled for replacement starting in April.”

He also noted that additional grant funding has been secured for other ongoing town projects.

When asked about broader challenges, Anderson said that issues between the town’s various boards have been an obstacle.

“The boards are not working very well together,” he said. “That’s been problematic.”

Anderson concluded by expressing goodwill toward his successor. “I wish whoever succeeds me the best of luck with the town,” he said. “I hope it goes well.”

Anderson’s departure comes during what some town officials describe as a period of disorder within Andover’s leadership. First Selectman Jeff Maguire acknowledged that the board has been struggling with internal conflict in recent months.

In a previous interview, Maguire said, “Chaos destroys organizations. And what was occurring and what has occurred on our board since Paula King has resigned was a level of chaos that causes problems.”

Maguire’s remarks were made in the context of another issue that plagued the town recently – the controversial firing of the town’s senior center director, Tess Grous, which was followed by a lawsuit and her eventual reinstatement. Still, Maguire drew a clear connection between that situation and the overall tension among board members.

“Hopefully we’ve learned a lesson [from the Grous situation] and we do things better and we all work together to get the best result for the entire community,” he said.

Maguire also referenced Anderson’s resignation directly, calling it part of the ongoing turmoil. “That is just continuing the chaos,” he said.

While the Board of Selectmen will most likely soon determine who will lead Andover in the interim, Anderson’s move to Massachusetts marks the end of an era that saw notable development projects completed and others positioned for success. His comments suggest both pride in what he accomplished – and concern for the future of the town he is leaving behind.

West Road Ball Field Gets Facelift

Back in July, Marlborough Lions Club member, Jean Paul Bolduc, watched a game at the West Road Ball Field where his two grandsons were playing. It was the first time Bolduc had been at the field, in spite of living in town for 46 years.

As he watched his grandkids on the field, the distant scoreboard caught his eye. The scoreboard was weathered and dingy. It was at that moment he decided to initiate a project on behalf of the Marlborough Lions Club. He enlisted the aid of fellow Lions Tom Reiser and John Glynn to commence the project. Along with the assistance of Lions Ken Hjulstorm and Douglas Zybrands, who helped Bolduc erect scaffolding, they took on the task of preparing the score-

board's surface for a fresh coat of paint.

Bolduc removed the top section, which had a large amount of detailed lettering, and took it back to his garage where he painstakingly hand-painted the lettering on the sign. The rest of the sign was repainted from the scaffold.

The work was performed around the schedule of activities at the field and also had to take into account the weather, but it was finally completed. After nearly 150 hours of work, the sign now glistens with a fresh coat of paint and new lettering.

With its new paint job and bright new lettering, it is hoped that the scoreboard will continue to serve the community for many years to come, the Lions said.

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Democratic Candidates Share Goals, Experience

As Marlborough residents prepare to head to the polls this Nov. 4, a diverse slate of candidates is vying for positions on the Board of Selectmen and Board of Education. A mix of incumbents and newcomers, the candidates recently talked to the *Rivereast* about their goals and hopes for the town, and also touted their own experience.

Board of Selectmen Candidates

Susan McFarland, who is running for a seat on the Board of Selectmen, said that community service has always been an important part of her life. She explained that she has volunteered for many organizations, including the American Cancer Society’s Relay for Life, local sports leagues and the Marlborough Zoning Commission.

“I’ve donated my time and experience to help raise money for causes I believe in and to give back to my community,” McFarland said.

With her recent retirement, McFarland said she felt it was the perfect opportunity to put her management experience to work for the town.

“Service is rewarding, and with my recent retirement, I decided it was the perfect time to volunteer my management skills and experience to our town by running for the Board of Selectmen,” she shared.

McFarland pointed to her decades of management experience as key preparation for the role.

“I managed both domestic and international teams and programs throughout my career and worked with people from every department and area of expertise,” she said.

She added that working across large organi-

zations taught her that every participant brings something valuable to the table – a lesson she said applies equally to local government.

“I think the same is true in our town – we need to listen to different perspectives in order to find the best solutions for our seniors, families, students and businesses alike.”

If elected, McFarland said her main focus would be on fiscal efficiency and maintaining services residents depend on.

“I was taught to spend every dollar wisely, so my main goal will be to manage our town operations as efficiently as possible to keep taxes affordable while ensuring our neighbors get the services they have come to expect,” she said. She also highlighted the importance of economic growth, strong schools and protecting the town’s natural spaces, noting that all three are important to her.

McFarland said she hopes more residents will become involved in town service. “Serving on a local Board or Commission is a unique way to be of service to your community,” she explained. “I wish more people would get involved because I believe more voices and input will bring the best outcome for Marlborough.”

Anthony Bratz, another candidate for the Board of Selectmen, said his decision to run for the board was motivated by the need for broader representation and more transparency in town government. He said the current board’s average age of 77 leaves a gap in perspective for younger residents.

Absentee Ballots: Connecticut law allows voters to receive an absentee ballot if they cannot appear at their assigned polling place on election day because of active service in the military, absence from the town, illness, religious tenets forbidding secular activity on the day of the election, duties as an election official at a polling place other than your own during all of the hours of voting, or physical disability.

To request an absentee ballot for the Nov. 4th election: First, obtain an absentee ballot application online, in person, or by mail. A Connecticut-issued DMV ID is required for online applications. Then, return the completed application to the Town Clerk’s Office. The voter will then receive an absentee ballot.

Next, cast your vote using the absentee ballot.

Lastly, return the ballot to the town clerk’s office by 8 p.m. on Tuesday, Nov. 4, by USPS mail, in person, or deposit it into the secure drop boxes located at Town Hall.

“I believe the board needs representation for younger families,” Bratz said, adding that “the current perspective doesn’t fully capture the challenges that younger residents face.”

He also said that, as a taxpayer, he wants a better understanding of how town funds are spent and to have a say in the budgeting process.

Bratz compared municipal finances to managing a household. “The town, like any family, operates on a fixed budget, and we must carefully weigh needs versus wants to fund our priorities,” he said.

Professionally, Bratz is a mechanical engineer who oversees more than 20 multi-million-dollar contracts. He said this work has given him experience in managing complex projects, budgets and personnel. He described himself as comfortable with “necessary confrontation” and willing to challenge unsound proposals when needed.

If elected, Bratz said his priorities would include managing major upcoming projects – such as renovations at Marlborough Elementary School, RHAM and Fire Station 1 – while ensuring fair financing. He spoke on how he would prioritize town audits to secure favorable bonding and distribute long-term costs equitably.

Another major focus for Bratz would be increasing public access to town government. He said that 7 p.m. meetings on weekdays are difficult for many residents to attend and proposed making meeting minutes more detailed and informative so people can stay up to date without watching full recordings.

“An informed community is a strong community,” Bratz said.

Bratz added that he wants voters to support him based on his ideas and qualifications rather than party affiliation.

“I want to be clear that I am seeking votes based on my ideas, experience and merit, not simply my party affiliation,” he said. Bratz also encouraged residents to meet the Democratic slate at upcoming “Coffee with the Candidates” events on Oct. 26, Nov. 1 and Nov. 2 at 9 a.m. at the Marlborough Bakery & Café.

Board of Education Candidates

Raymond Morris, who currently serves as chairperson of the Board, is seeking another term on the Board of Education for Marlborough, and he said his motivation to run stems from a lifelong connection to teaching and public service.

He explained that he comes from a family of educators and that he previously taught high school English before becoming a psychiatrist.

“My grandmother taught elementary school math for 30 years, my parents met while teaching and my sister has taught for 25 years,” explained Morris.

He shared that his two daughters’ positive experiences at Marlborough Elementary School inspired him to get more involved. After a seat on the board opened a few years ago, he applied and was appointed unanimously by the Board of Selectmen.

“Being on the BOE therefore allows me to fuse my love of schools, teaching and learning with giving back to my community,” he said.

Morris said both his background as a teacher and his professional work as a psychiatrist prepare him for the role. He described his leadership approach as objective and deliberative, emphasizing listening and critical thinking.

“Every day I listen objectively to all sides before making a decision,” he said. “I seek to make sure all viewpoints are heard before decisions are made and votes cast.”

Looking ahead, Morris said one of the board’s top priorities will be replacing the school’s roof and HVAC system, a costly project he hopes to manage efficiently. He said he aims to maintain MES’s strong academic performance while keeping costs manageable for residents.

“I believe in a quality education for all students at a tax rate that all citizens, especially those on a fixed income, can afford,” he said.

William “Bill” Guzman, also running for the Board of Education, said he views strong schools as the cornerstone of a connected community.

“I believe that strong, well-supported schools are the foundation of a vibrant and connected town,” he shared. He added that he wants decisions on the board to be “guided by transparency and fiscal responsibility.”

Guzman has more than 30 years of experience as an educator and administrator in Connecticut, along with degrees in law, education and business. He said this combination of backgrounds prepares him well for policy and financial oversight. His goals include providing high-quality educational opportunities, ensuring responsible budgeting and promoting inclusivity so that “every child has access to opportunities that will help them achieve their full potential.”

Democratic candidates **Linda Earley** and **Pamela Farrington** were unable to be reached for comment; however, both still remain on the ballot.

Lions Provide Vision Screening at MES

The Marlborough Lions Club recently provided free vision screening for Marlborough children at the Elmer Thienes Mary Hall School on Oct. 14. Over 163 children were screened. The screening is non-invasive and does not require any eye drops. The procedure uses a photographic process from a distance of three feet to detect any anomalies.

The screening is performed to detect early indications of far and near sightedness, astigmatism, anisometropia, strabismus, ambliopia and anisocoria. If an issue is detected, the school nurse is informed so that the parents can be advised to seek further evaluation.

The vision screening camera and printer cost approximately \$8,000 and it has been used frequently for vision screening in Marlborough and in other area communities and day care facilities.

to talk to people about just why they like cemeteries and the art of it all.”

For those not selling or crafting, the Harvest Moon Festival offered the simple joy of togetherness. Kylie Jeter of Colchester and her friend Megan Aldridge of Marlborough attended with their families, excited to soak up the community spirit.

“It’s a great event for children,” Jeter said, as her two kids ran around excitedly.

Aldridge, who works for AHM Youth and Family services, said events like this are vital for small towns. “I think that it really brings the community together,” she said. “You can see friends and family and have a great time.”

They planned to visit the AHM art show later that day and explore more of the vendors. “We only made it through the food so far,” Jeter laughed, “but there is a great variety of food this year.”

Food trucks like Hungry Lion and Rustic Treats are regular fixtures, Habicht noted, and each brings its own following. “People actually come to the event for them,” she said. “They change up their menu to fit the theme of the event that we’re having, and they’re with us at every event.”

From day into night, the festival pulsed with energy- glowing pumpkins, laughter and the rhythmic hum of live music weaving through the grounds. Spooky decorations added to the atmosphere- so spooky they nearly scared this brave reporter off the job. While this year’s turnout was

slightly smaller than in previous years, Habicht said the heart of the event remained strong.

“Five people organized the Harvest Moon Festival,” she said proudly. “And it is amazing – the dedication that our team has.”

Proceeds from the festival, she explained, go directly back into the community through The Town Center Project’s various initiatives.

“We host the summer concert series in town. We do Make Music Day [and] the Maple Festival,” Habicht said. “One hundred percent of any proceeds that we make at any of our events goes right back into our community. Nobody gets paid. ... Heck, we don’t even feed ourselves!”

Looking ahead, Habicht said residents can look forward to more seasonal favorites, including the Hebron Community Chorus concert on Nov. 15 at St. Peter’s and the return of the Snow-folk the first weekend of December – whimsical art installations that have become a local winter highlight.

As the night deepened, the festival glowed with a small-town warmth that no chill down the spine could dim. For vendors like Duffy and Fitzgerald, and for families like Jeter’s and Aldridge’s, the Harvest Moon Festival was more than an event – it was a celebration of connection, creativity and community spirit.

As Duffy put it with a grin before the night came to a close: “Whatever you’re doing, just have a magical day – with a K.”

one of them is gonna foal before the end of the year, and then the other one likely will be spring.”

“We certainly weren’t told they were pregnant when they came to us,” she said. “That was something we found out when we were caring for them and taking care of them.”

Randall said she has a soft spot for one of the rescues, a Belgian named Bentley.

“Bentley is hard not to fall in love with,” she said. “He was very scared and withdrawn from us when he first came, like when you went into the stall, he would hide in the corner and put his head down and it was just heartbreaking, and now as soon as you walk to his stall door, he is right there and he’s lick-

ing you and he’s looking for pets and treats.”

Randall said she knows that the rescue is only Bentley’s temporary home, while the court case is getting resolved and before he is likely adopted, but she also knows there will be other horses needing rescuing in the future.

For those interested in helping, Randall pointed people to the organization’s website, www.ctdraftrescue.org, where they can find ways to donate, volunteer or purchase items off their Amazon wish list. The rescue is fully run by volunteers and relies on monetary donations and donated items to cover feed, bedding, medical care and supplies.

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School Board Hopefuls Look to Balance Cost and Benefit

Six candidates will be on the ballot for five Board of Education seats this election. Candidates on both sides of the aisle worried about unfunded state mandates, a state education funding system that puts burdens on small towns, and achieving student success. Democratic candidates in particular also focused on avoiding cuts to services, while Republican candidates focused on trimming spending.

Democrats
Incumbent **Nancy Kohler** has lived in East Hampton for over 20 years. In an email, Kohler wrote that she grew up in a family of teachers before going on to teach kindergarten herself. Though she left the profession to raise her children, Kohler has continued to put her education skills to work for the community as a PTO member, parent volunteer and as a member of the Board of Education.

“All of these experiences,” she wrote, “have allowed me to understand both the challenges and struggles faced by our students and teachers, as well as their tremendous growth and success.”

Kohler said she was proud of the work she had done on the Board of Education, and said that bipartisan collaboration was part of that success. She said one of her goals would be to continue to advocate at the state level for funding reforms to decrease the burden that school districts carry.

She also said she believed in “utiliz[ing] the knowledge and experience gained from experts, a reliance on facts and a willingness to engage in constructive dialogue in order to find resolutions to difficult situations.”

“I believe both our school system and our community need to be nurtured, supported and given adequate resources to grow,” she wrote. “Without progress and growth, we fall behind.”

Sarah Strange is a 12-year East Hampton resident with a degree in finance. She’s also a mom to a 10-year-old who attends East Hampton public schools.

Strange said she was frustrated watching the school budget process last year, adding that she thought a lot of the suggestions for getting the budget numbers down were “not great,” among them getting rid of teachers (which would increase class sizes), cutting a school psychologist position, eliminating middle school health class-

es and making cuts to special education.

“In my personal opinion,” said Strange, “those don’t feel like they are thoughtful eliminations or cuts.”

Strange said she knows that many kids in school today started school during the pandemic, and are still dealing with the consequences of that experience.

“They will need a little extra support to get up and running and reach the same levels as other kids that didn’t have to start school during a pandemic.”

Strange said she understands why budgets can be so hard to pass, and she’s sympathetic.

“I totally get it,” she said. “I pay taxes in this town as well, and no, I do not want to see them go up like that; however, here in the state of Connecticut, taxes in the town are the primary source of revenue for our schools, so we need to kind of get comfortable with the idea that taxes are not going to be at the same level that they were in, say, 1983. They’re just not. Life is different. The world is different.”

She also said that she believes it’s possible to lessen education’s tax burden, but she said that will take collaboration and partnership.

“We’re all in this together, so let’s actually work together and see what we can do to make a better outcome for everyone,” she said. “And yes, I know that could be naïve, but I’m still gonna hope.”

Corinne Clark-Barney grew up in East Hampton, and is a product of East Hampton public schools. She moved back to town about six years ago, and is a career educator who has worked as a teacher, a district-level administrator, and a school principal in Hartford. She said that that experience helps her understand not just education priorities, but also education budgets and how to explain them to the public.

“That’s why for me, it was important to run now,” she said, “because I do understand the inner workings of a school district and what goes into a building a budget, and I also know how to communicate that transparently.”

Clark-Barney added that parents aren’t the only residents who need to understand what a school budget is covering, and said that it was important to make sure everyone knew what

their tax dollars were going towards.

She also said her priorities included maintaining smaller class sizes and supporting students’ social emotional needs, but she emphasized the importance of elective classes at the middle and high school levels as well. She also expressed frustration with the state’s funding model, calling it “inequitable” and saying it placed an unfair burden on smaller districts.

Clark-Barney said that, if elected, she hoped to work together to avoid a big budget fight.

“I’d like to be able to be a part of being able to bring some collaboration, as well as some consensus,” she said, “so that we’re all on the same page and we see that we’re really here to do what’s best for the kids in our town, so that way they can come back and move back to town and be contributing members to the town in the community.”

Republicans
Incumbent and longtime resident **Sal Nucifora** is an engineer who describes himself as a “solid conservative.”

Nucifora said that he wanted to “continue the work of enhancing our education in East Hampton at as low a cost as possible,” and added that he wanted to make sure that special education services were not cut, despite their high price tag.

“I’d like to see us be as cost-effective as possible while maintaining as high a level of education for those specialized students as possible,” Nucifora said. At the same time, Nucifora said he wanted to explain to the community the high proportion of special education students and the cost that entails, so that they understand why the budget looks like it does.

He also said that he believed the state’s unfunded mandates left towns with an unfair burden and said he hoped to be able to advocate alongside other towns for the state to improve funding opportunities.

Nathan Jaycox is an engineer who has worked at both Millstone Nuclear Power Station and Electric Boat, and who became certified as a high school physics teacher several years ago.

In an email, Jaycox said that he does not have children who are students in the East Hampton school system, but still believes in the importance of education. He said his focus would be on improving test scores.

Jaycox said keeping costs low for taxpayers was a priority for him, and wrote that he believed that “expanding and leveraging volunteer tutoring resources from the community will help even more to meet higher goals with no additional cost.”

Sarah LeBlanc did not respond to the *Rivereast News Bulletin’s* attempt to contact her; however, her biography on the Republican Town Committee’s website describes her as a resident of East Hampton for the past 13 years who works in technology risk management.

“I focus on problem-solving, strategic planning and decision-making – skills that directly translate to effective board leadership,” reads her bio.

As a parent to school-age children, she notes that she is “personally invested in the quality of education and the strength of our community.”

“I am running for the East Hampton Board of Education because I care about the future of our schools and the success of the students,” she writes, noting that she also advocates for “transparency and accountability.”

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Meet the Democratic Town Council Candidates

East Hampton’s Democratic candidates for Town Council include four incumbents who are looking for more two-year terms. Their priorities include prioritizing education, smart development, maintaining services, building a new fire station, and increasing communication with the public. All of them spoke about the importance of balancing the needs of younger families and the concerns of senior citizens.

Incumbent **Karen Wanat** said she’s looking forward to continuing the work she’s done on the council for the past two years, and said that one of her biggest priorities involves revising the town’s Plan of Conservation and Development. Wanat said she wants that plan to focus more on the town planning component, adding that she wants to “identify the types of housing that we need and where [it] can go in the town.”

When it comes to new housing, particularly any senior housing, she said she wants to prioritize smart planning and choose locations carefully, “so that senior citizens have nearby access to the right types of services [like health care].”

While she wants to make sure the senior population is taken care of, Wanat also said she wants to make sure that education is adequately supported. She’s herself is involved with education in the town, serving on the PTO in the past, and also leading the Center School’s drama program for the past few years, and she said that a healthy school system is important for all town residents, not just those with children in the schools.

“People move to a town for the education system,” she said. “If you don’t continue to support it in the right way, your property values are going to go down and then services across the whole town have to go down because people don’t want to live here.”

Incumbent and current council chairman **Dean Markham** is running for his second term. The lifelong East Hampton resident and CPA’s roots run deep, as a tenth-generation descen-

dant of the town’s early settlers.

Markham said some of his priorities as a council member include developing a public water system, developing a new senior center, and building a new, up-to-date fire station. When it comes to all of these issues, Markham said he believes an important part of the council’s job should be “getting the word out” and communicating with the public so that they understand the work that town government is doing and have enough information to know where they stand on important issues.

Markham also said he prioritizes “civility,” and noted that the council often agrees upon a lot, despite party divides, even if it isn’t clear to the public. Budget issues, he said, can be contentious, but “I would say that an easy way to look at it is: the votes that we take on the council on issues, we’re probably better than 95% of our votes are unanimous.” Markham said he hopes to be able to build on that collaborative energy in his next term.

Incumbent **Jack Solomon** has been involved in town governance and community service organizations since retiring here two decades ago and buying Lake Pocotopaug’s Laurel Island with his wife, who has since passed. He has served on the Rotary Club, the Lake Commission, the Clean Energy Task Force, and the Library Board.

In an email, Solomon said that affordability was a big priority for him, but so is education. His late wife was an educator, as are all three of his daughters, and he said his own career, as a chemist at industrial gas company Praxair, was “enabled by education.”

Solomon also noted preservation of the lake as a big priority and one that he has worked on personally for years. He also said if reelected, he would advocate for increased support for the Fire Department and Ambulance Corps, and work to “invest in and maintain our infrastructure like roads, but also new infrastructure like [public] a water system.”

Incumbent **Richard Knotek** is a career accountant who likes to say that “people count.” The lifelong East Hampton resident has been involved in town government for decades, having served terms on both the old Board of Selectmen and the Board of Education. He’s also served on several regional nonprofit boards for organizations dealing with homelessness, addiction and poverty.

In an email, Knotek said he took pride in his time working for the community, and noted in particular his past work on the Board of Education to institute a writing program that led to improved test scores. He also said he took pride in his work on the town council to “stop the wholesale giveaway of our town to both unchecked development and abuse of our lake.”

Knotek said that in his next term, he would hope to prioritize supporting the ambulance, fire and police departments; protecting the lake and land from overdevelopment; and searching for ways to keep property taxes in check for elderly and low-income residents. He also added that he hoped to “encourage more people to serve our town government on boards and commissions.”

Knotek lamented that politics have become so divisive, even at the local level, and emphasized that he’s striving to find some unity and cooperation in what he said will be his final term on the council if elected, adding that he hopes to “lead with dignity and respect for all residents, regardless of political persuasion or opinion.”

Joelyn Leon has lived in East Hampton for 23 years and has long been involved in politics,

but she said she had never planned on becoming a candidate before. As the political director for the Connecticut AFL-CIO, she said her career has prepared her for an elected role, particularly when it comes to bridging political gaps and working collaboratively.

“I feel like I’ve been able to build some very strong relationships with people who don’t necessarily agree with me and my perspective,” she said, adding that “the divisiveness is just horrible [these days], and we have to get past that and I feel that if I do win that I can bring hopefully some collaboration back to the table, some willingness to actually talk.”

Leon said she’s been doing a lot of door-knocking to find out what’s on voter’s minds and she’s been hearing a lot about the cost of living.

She said if she were elected, she would do “whatever it is in my power to make sure we have a budget that is transparent, but that is sufficient for our town.”

“Obviously, you don’t want to increase taxes for citizens, but we have to make sure we have our services and we have education so that we can have a town where people want to live,” she said. She added that getting the new firehouse built would also be a priority.

Leon said she wants East Hampton to be “a great community to raise kids in and to grow old in.”

“You can have both,” she added. “They are not mutually exclusive at all, but we have to work together to make it a reality.”

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Meet the Republican Town Council Candidates

Five Republican candidates are running for East Hampton's Town Council this year. They all say they're focused on budget transparency and fiscal responsibility, but differ slightly in their approaches. Some key issues that they are focused on include plans for the new firehouse, managing education costs and taking care of local seniors.

Incumbent **Ted Hintz** is a CPA and financial planner who is a fourth generation East Hampton resident. In the past, he has also served on the Board of Finance and chaired the East Hampton Housing Authority, where he said he was particularly proud of his work to reshape a Community Development Block Grant that enabled improvements to senior housing.

In an email, Hintz said that "transparency, accountability and affordability" were goals for him, and added that he wanted to "ensure every tax dollar delivers value."

Hintz said his priorities included fiscal responsibility, as well as development and housing. "We need to keep East Hampton affordable for families and seniors," he said, "[However] I do not support state-mandated overdevelopment that would change the character of our town or place heavy burdens on our schools and local services."

Hintz said he wanted residents to be in charge of planning decisions, and advocated for "transparent, community-driven processes that balance growth with preservation."

"I want East Hampton to remain a place where families can stay, seniors can retire with dignity, and small businesses can thrive without being taxed out of existence," he said.

Current Board of Finance member **Alannah**

Coshow said that her biggest goals as a candidate are "transparency in government and involving the taxpayers." The Connecticut native said she grew up with politics talked about around the dinner table, with both of her parents involved in local government in Meriden and uncle who was a state senator. She grew up spending summers on Lake Pocotopaug and moved here in 1992 when her husband finished his career in the Navy.

In addition to serving on the Board of Finance, over the past 30 years, Coshow has also served on the Watercourse Agency, the Zoning Board of Appeals, and as the Registrar of Voters.

"I want to continue to take a stand against the ever-increasing taxes," she said, adding that she is concerned about education costs that she said are rising despite declining enrollment, and which she blames on unfunded state mandates.

While she said she's inclined to decrease spending, she also said that she is in favor of spending on some issues. As an example, she cited road maintenance, which she said is the number one issue she hears voters talking about.

"That's a huge part of why I want to run for Town Council," she said, "because I'm listening and I hear what the voters want."

Like many other candidates, **Darin Hurne** is a lifelong East Hampton resident who attended public schools. The Air Force veteran and founder of an HVAC controls business has been a volunteer firefighter and served on the Planning and Zoning Commission in the past.

In an email, Hurne said, "I'm running because I love this town and I'm frustrated [at] where we're headed."

He said rising taxes were of particular con-

cern to him, and said that prioritizing senior citizens and lowering their tax burdens was particularly important to him.

Among his key priorities, Hurne said a new fire station was key, and he expressed frustration with the way the process has unfolded in the past. He said he was also concerned about education accountability, and expressed frustration over rising spending amidst declining enrollment.

"We need clear accountability to ensure dollars are tied to results," he said.

"I'm running not out of ambition, but out of frustration — and out of love for East Hampton," Hurne wrote. "We can do better, and we must."

Incumbent **Tim Feegel** has lived in East Hampton his whole life, and he said he learns a lot about what his fellow residents care about when he's shopping at the hardware store.

"I could go to Ace Hardware and go get a quart of paint and I'm there for an hour and a half," he said. That's because people come up to talk to him, and Feegel said that listening to residents is important. He said that interactions like that make him do his homework, or "at least get my facts straight, so when somebody questions me, I can actually answer them better."

Among his top priorities, Feegel said, is education. He said that he knows making education both "good and affordable" is very difficult. He said that he's sympathetic to older residents living on fixed incomes and wants to keep taxes low for them, but he also said that he draws the line at cutting teachers, saying he would prefer to trim the budget in other ways.

Relatedly, Feegel said another of his priorities for an upcoming term would include fiscal responsibility and keeping costs down, while also maintaining services. He prioritized coming up with a plan for a new firehouse and said the town needs to reconsider all potential options. He said he also advocates encouraging development, but in a careful way, noting that "I want to still live in a quaint little town."

After several terms, Feegel said he's proud of the work the council has accomplished, and he said sometimes working across the aisle is part of getting things done.

"I feel that I work well with others, meaning that I want to listen to a lot of people on both sides," he said, adding that he has on occasion voted across party lines when he thought it was right.

"I don't make a habit of it," he said, "but I also think I want to go to bed and night and go, hey, you know, I still think I did the right thing."

Eric Peterson didn't respond to our attempts to contact him, but in his official bio on the Republican Town Committee's website, he described himself as a fourth-generation resident of East Hampton and said that if elected, he would value residents of all ages.

"I want both our seniors and my own children to be able to afford to live here and thrive," he wrote. "That means making responsible decisions – being vocal about prudent spending while remaining open-minded to compromise and the needs of our town."

Election Day is Tuesday, Nov. 4. Early voting is currently underway.

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Meet the Candidates for Board of Finance

Candidates for the Board of Finance include two Democrats and four Republicans. Priorities for all include balancing the tax burdens on residents with the need to fund services.

Democrats

David Caterisano is a financial professional and Coast Guard veteran who wrote in an email that his priorities were “transparency, long-term planning, and making sure every tax dollar is spent widely to benefit the whole community.” Caterisano said that as both a parent and a homeowner, he understands the need for “balancing essential services with fair taxation.”

Daniel Finn is a financial advisor and long-time resident seeking a position on the Board of Finance. Per his biography on the Democratic Town Committee website, Finn is a father of six children who said he understands the importance of keeping taxes fair, “especially for those with limited means and income.” If elected, he says on the website, he will aim to prioritize “transparency, accountability and long-term financial planning.”

Republicans

Former Town Council member **Alison Walck** said she’s running for the Board of Finance this time for a simple reason: “I love money,” she said, and she said she wants to keep more of it in resident’s pockets.

“I would love to come up with different ideas by which you can gain an income stream and not over tax the already overtaxed, or overbur-

dened residents,” Walck adds.

Walck said her big concern is “the upward spiraling taxes, property taxes.”

She said she’s always looking to cut taxes when she can, but also that she is “more than happy to keep an open mind when it comes to any budgetary request,” adding that, when she served on the council, she didn’t let politics bias her.

“I’m a hard-core Republican,” she said, “but I often voted with the Democrats because they made more sense.”

At the end of the day, Walck said she wants what’s best for the town, adding that in her opinion, East Hampton was fiscally well-run.

“East Hampton is a good community, but you’re always driving to make it better, and that’s hopefully by making the right fiscal decisions,” she said. “By making the correct and proper fiscal decisions, we can maintain what quality we have and hopefully increase the quality and the services for the town.”

Incumbent **Bridget McLennan** said she’s running for the Board of Finance because “taxes [are] pushing people out of the town, specifically seniors, and I have an issue with that.”

McLennan said budget transparency was her biggest goal. She said she had been unhappy with the Board of Education budget’s lack of transparency, as compared to the town’s budget, and expressed disappointment with how the firehouse planning had proceeded up until now.

She also said that being on the Board of Fi-

nance was a challenging job.

“Our role is to be in making decision that it’s for the entire community,” she said, “not [just] a single group. That’s what our focus needs to be when we’re making decisions. It’s what is good for all taxpayers, not specific groups that we like or don’t like.”

She said making decisions for the town was a lot like making decisions for one’s own household. “You have to rank the priorities that you’re spending money on,” she said, and then you have to figure out where you’re going to “get the most for your money.”

In an email, incumbent **Jim Radavich** wrote that he is running for a Board of Finance position because “I want to rein in spending to make East Hampton affordable.”

Radavich said he that, in addition to his time in local government, he has served the community as the T-ball director for the East Hampton Little League and that he has self-funded a volunteer-run homeless mission in Middletown for the past 7 years.

In an email, Radavich listed some of his priorities: On the topic of education, he said he would support the Board of Education cutting staff and potentially implementing a hiring freeze in response to declining student enrollment, and advocated for a more transparent school budget that lists spending per department.

He also advocated for zoning changes that would attract small to midsize companies in order to increase the tax base, and said he supported funding road repairs and senior services, hiring new police officers, continuing current lake cleanup programs, and working to determine the best site for the new fire station.

Joey Guest has a long history working in public service as a firefighter, deputy fire marshal, deputy emergency management director and a compliance officer. Guest wrote that “my professional career has taught me the importance of balancing budgets, making data-driven decisions, and listening to the concerns and the voters.”

Guest said his priorities as a candidate included supporting sustainable economic development, promoting financial transparency and community engagement, “planning proactively for the long-term fiscal health of our town,” and “ensuring taxpayer dollars are used wisely and efficiently.”

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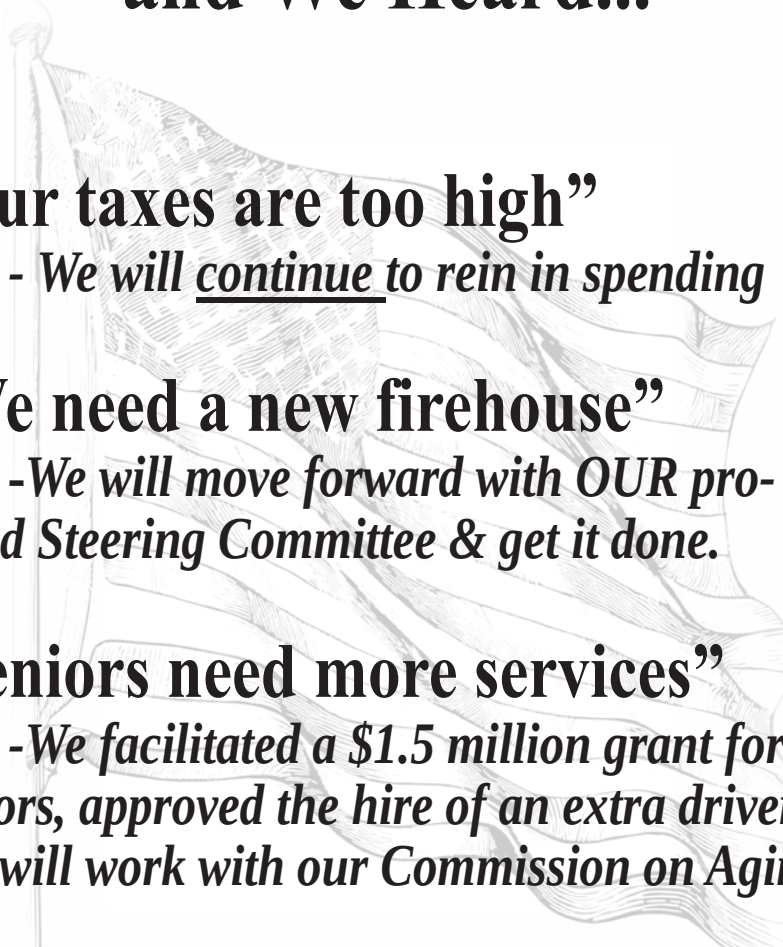

Raptors Volleyball Turns Toward Tourney

Following a frenzied five-set loss to Glastonbury, RHAM High School volleyball head coach Timothy Guernsey said that his team needs to work on closing out matches as the conference and state tournaments draw near.

"We have to be able to finish," explained Guernsey. "If we don't finish, it will be the same result."

Guernsey's squad twice led by a set and also took the advantage in the final frame, but could not polish off the visiting Guardians from Glastonbury as the road team rallied to win the marathon match that featured lead changes in each set and a total of 209 points.

The loss dropped the Raptors to 12-2 overall and snapped an eight-game winning streak.

"Those two losses that we have, Simsbury and tonight, we haven't been able to end the game when we needed to," noted Guernsey "We need to be able to put teams away."

Glastonbury also came into the contest red hot – winners of their last 12 – but early on the Raptors powerful front line led by seniors Meredith Weir, Abby Simao, Cecilia Zito, and Brooke Arcari took control near the net as the Raptors used a 12-7 scoring run midway through the opening set to take a lead they would not relinquish.

The Guardians retaliated in the second set as senior captain Reese Henderson began to exert her will, crushing several thunderous spikes, before the Raptors countered in the third set behind the precision passing from junior setter Rian Calhoun.

Simao had a kill to start the fourth set, but the Guardians reeled off the next 10 points to seize control. RHAM rallied late in the fourth with three straight points and cut the deficit to 24-23 following an ace from Gabriella Fushino, but a kill by Henderson sent the game into the decisive final set.

Henderson finished the night with a game-high 29 kills and Guernsey said once Glastonbury's all-state outside hitter found a groove, she was hard to stop.

Guernsey's group again took a lead in the fifth, jumping out to a 7-3 advantage following an ace by Calhoun, yet the pesky Guardians rallied once more and ended the match on a four-point run.

Once the 209th point was scored, the match ultimately ended up determining the winner of the Central Connecticut Conference (CCC) - North regular season championship.

Glastonbury head coach Melissa Reynolds was impressed with her team's ability to continue battling back.

"They wanted it," stated Reynolds. "They talked about it before the fifth set started. We had to play our game and not worry about them."

The result was a completely different story from the conference rivals earlier meeting this fall when the Raptors swept the Guardians in three-sets in Glastonbury on Sept. 5.

In the first meeting, Weir led the charge with 13 kills and a pair of aces. Weir also became the program all-time leading in aces this season when she tallied her 217th career ace earlier this month.

The Sept. 5 win over Glastonbury was one of four straight to open the season, which included wins over East Lyme, Southington, and South Windsor.

"I feel like our schedule needs to be more balanced. We had seven really good teams to start,

Glastonbury included, and then out schedule got a little weaker," noted Guernsey. "I feel like our schedule needs to have a little more balance so that we are prepared at the end of the season to play teams like this."

Guernsey's teams have been the model of consistency on the local volleyball scene. They have captured three state championships in the last four seasons and the program has won ten state titles since 2009.

Following the loss to Glastonbury, RHAM rebounded by defeating Norwich Free Academy

(Oct. 17) and South Windsor (Oct. 21) to bring their overall record of 15-2 as of publication.

Next up is the CCC tournament, which starts Monday, Oct. 27. The Raptors will be seeking their first outright conference title since 2019 when they dominated the conference from 2016-2019, winning the conference tourney in each of the four seasons.

The team will then turn their attention to the Class M state tournament, slated to start on Tuesday, Nov. 4.

Portland residents recently celebrated a long-awaited groundbreaking ceremony, for the new Riverfront Access Park.

On hand were state Rep. Christie Carpino (R-32), First Selectman Mike Pelton, and Board of Selectmen members Tim Lavoy, Jim Tripp and Rick Sharr. Also instrumental to this endeavor, but not able to attend, was state Sen. Norm Needleman (D-33), who helped to secure a state grant for the construction of a road from Airline Avenue to the river.

Gina D’Amico, representing the Tilcon Corporation and Brett Morrison from the CT River Conservancy, along with others, mentioned the collaboration of all the groups involved in making this a reality. Cooperation and coordination were exhibited between the town’s Riverfront Access Committee, local and state officials and Department of Energy and Environmental Protection.

This project would also not be possible without a grant from the State of Connecticut, a Rockfall Foundation grant, the donation of land

from the Field family and an easement from the Tilcon Corporation; which allowed access to the Connecticut River. The Riverfront Access Committee also thanked Nancy Woolhouse Mueller, Susan Bransfield and Ryan Curley for their vision and support of this plan.

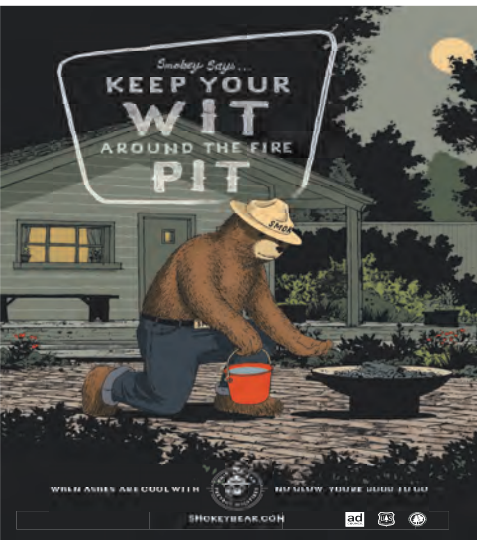

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McNeely, Webster Outline Priorities for Schools and Finances

The *Rivereast* last week profiled three of the four people running on the Republican slate for the Board of Education. The fourth, **Cody McNeely**, was unavailable for that story, but this week he was able to speak with the *Rivereast* and outline his goals if elected.

McNeely said his motivation to run is rooted in his commitment to family and community. McNeely explained that his family has a strong relationship with Colchester’s school district and that his “two daughters have thrived at Colchester Elementary and Jack Jackter Intermediate School.” He added that he is running “to protect our schools and enhance their success through support and service.”

McNeely currently works as a “knowledge manager” for a defense consulting company supporting shipbuilding in Groton and previously served 20 years on active duty in the U.S. Navy, retiring on Dec. 31, 2024. During his military career, he said he “led instructor teams and spearheaded adult education curriculum development initiatives, as well as provided healthcare and program management underway.”

McNeely said his experience “building teams and collaborating with diverse groups” has prepared him to “advance Colchester’s schools for our community’s greatest assets – our children

and educators.”

Looking ahead, McNeely said his top priority for Colchester schools is “collaborating with the Board of Finance and Education, along with the community, to bring back the trust and partnership we need.”

He highlighted the importance of bridging “gaps in communication” and fostering “the high level of clarity and accountability our community deserves.”

McNeely also said he aims to strengthen special education programs “to attract back students lost to other districts,” noting that his older daughter, who is a student that participates in the aforementioned programs, “has flourished in her confidence and love for learning.”

Likewise, last week’s profile of the town’s Republican Board of Finance candidates did not include **Amber Webster**, who was unavailable. But she also recently spoke with the *Rivereast* and outlined her hopes and concerns.

Webster said her decision to run is from a desire to make the town’s budgeting process more transparent and understandable for residents.

“I believe our town’s budgeting systems are overly complex and not easily understood by most residents,” she said.

Webster explained that she wants “more transparency and open communication” so that residents can stay informed and more easily understand where tax dollars are being spent and how decisions are being made. She said her goal is to “help bridge that gap and make the financial process more accessible and understandable for everyone in our community.”

With over six years of experience in finance and more than a decade in health care, Webster said she has spent that time “focusing on business operations and revenue management.”

She explained that her background has given her “a strong understanding of how to manage budgets efficiently, identify unnecessary spending and ensure that every dollar is used wisely.” She added that she plans to apply that same approach to town finances by “prioritizing essential needs, eliminating waste and making sure our spending aligns with what taxpayers truly value.”

If elected, Webster spoke on her top priorities for the town, such as “improving transparency and communication throughout the budget process and strengthening collaboration with the Board of Education.”

Since education spending represents a large portion of the town’s budget, she said it is criti-

cal to “review proposals carefully, ask the right questions and take the time to ensure that funds are being allocated responsibly.”

Webster also voiced concerns about rising taxes in Colchester, noting that “under Democratic leadership, taxes in our town have increased by 12% over the past three years.”

This is a sentiment shared by many candidates. She warned that continued increases could make the town “unaffordable for many – especially our seniors on fixed incomes, families already struggling to make ends meet and younger generations who are finding it increasingly difficult to afford a home in today’s economy.”

Webster said she believes town officials must be careful stewards of public funds.

“Just as taxpayers must stretch every dollar in their own households, the town must do the same,” she said. “At the end of the day, this is taxpayer money – and we need to ensure it’s being used wisely, efficiently and always in the best interest of the people of Colchester.”

Election Day is Tuesday, Nov. 4; early voting is currently underway.

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First Selectman Candidate Still Owes Me \$1K, Resident Says

A Colchester woman said a local political candidate has failed to comply with a court order requiring him to return her \$1,000 security deposit, which she feels raises questions about accountability as he seeks public office.

According to records from the Connecticut Superior Court in New London, Magistrate Frances Mary Michelson-Dera ruled on May 22, 2025, that John and Natalie Thomas were “not justified in retaining the plaintiff’s security deposit” and ordered them to return \$1,000 plus interest to plaintiff Shannon Nazario by June 23, 2025.

The order stated that Nazario had rented property in Colchester from August 2018 through May 2024, paying \$1,000 a month in rent and a \$1,000 security deposit. The court found that while her rent payments were “sporadic,” there was “no evidence that late fees were charged, nor were eviction proceedings commenced.”

The magistrate determined that the defendants’ photographs of alleged damage were taken before Nazario had finished cleaning the apartment, and that “the balance of the photos showed normal wear and tear after six years of occupancy.” The court concluded the landlords “were not justified in retaining the plaintiff’s security deposit” and ordered repayment.

As of press time, Nazario said the defendants have still not complied with that ruling.

“The ruling was issued on May 22, 2025, with a deadline of June 23 for payment, and they have yet to comply with the order,” Nazario stated.

Thomas declined to comment on the matter for this story, saying Nazario “can spread whatever she wants about [the situation]. I’m not going to comment on that. It’s an ongoing case.”

As more than four months have passed without receiving payment, Nazario said she has now decided to take the next legal step.

“I plan to return to court... to file a Writ of Execution and request to attach their bank account. This costs me even more time, energy

and out-of-pocket expenses- but I don’t feel like I have a choice.”

She described the original court ruling as “a partial win.”

“In some ways, yes – it was validating that the court saw through their false evidence and ruled in my favor,” she said. “But justice doesn’t mean much if it’s not enforced. Right now, the burden is still on me to chase down what the court already decided I’m owed.”

Nazario added that she also felt the court was “overly lenient in denying the second thousand,” explaining that she had sought double damages under state law. She said the Thomases claimed they withheld the deposit due to a late payment, “which wasn’t true,” and that “if they had ever asked for a late fee, I would’ve paid it without hesitation.”

Nazario said that since the May ruling, there has been no communication from the Thomases.

“They’ve gone completely silent,” she said. “Not a word of acknowledgment, apology or effort to resolve the matter – even after losing the case.”

She said the financial and emotional toll has been significant.

“It’s been incredibly stressful,” she said. “I’ve been recovering from surgery, dealing with ongoing health issues and facing financial hardship. That money could’ve gone toward basic needs, medical expenses or even just helped me breathe a little easier. Instead, I’ve had to spend more time, energy and emotional bandwidth dealing with filing and court actions that should never have been necessary.”

Nazario shared that her decision to speak publicly stems from concern about accountability, as Thomas is running for a leadership role as first selectman of Colchester.

“I hope people realize that character matters- especially when someone is asking for public trust in a leadership role,” she said. “If John can’t follow a court order, can’t respect the law and tries to submit false evidence to avoid responsi-

bility, why would anyone believe he’ll honor his word to the community? Leadership starts with integrity in the small things. If he can’t be honest or accountable in private matters, he has no business representing the public.”

Nazario said she shared her story “from a place of honesty, vulnerability and full transparency.”

“I didn’t hold anything back, even when it made me feel exposed or judged,” she said. “I’ve

taken full accountability for my part in this situation and shared my experience exactly as it happened.”

Nazario said she hopes speaking out encourages others to demand accountability from those in power. “Leadership without accountability is just performance without a title,” she said. “And this situation has made that painfully clear.”

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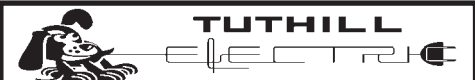
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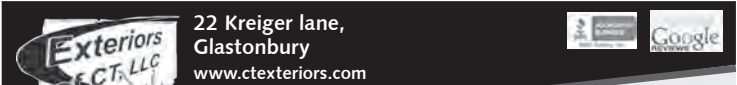

Sweet New Beginnings at Marlborough Bakery & Café

The smell of freshly baked bread and apple fritters drifts through the air of Marlborough Bakery & Café on a crisp October morning. Behind the counter, the hum of an espresso machine mingles with the low murmur of conversation and the occasional burst of laughter. A woman with a bright smile and a thick New York accent, who is often busy floating between tables and greeting customers, warmly greeted the *Rivereast*.

That woman is Sandy Squillante, the new owner and driving force behind the bakery’s revival.

“I did take it over,” she said, leaning casually back in her office chair. “What inspired me? I moved here six years ago, and I fell in love with the bakery.”

For Squillante, who spent decades in the restaurant industry, taking over the bakery was both a change of pace and continuation of a lifelong passion.

“I’m 70 years old,” she said. “I didn’t want to stand behind the stove for 12 hours anymore, and [the bakery] was an easy fit. It looked like fun – it was always buzzing.”

She laughed that it’s still hard work; she said running the bakery is “a labor of love,” but one that she wouldn’t trade.

The bakery, nestled in the heart of Marlborough, is a gathering place for locals and visitors alike. Since taking over, Squillante has added tables near the fireplace, and the decor feels both cozy and vibrant.

“The bakery is a place not only where you get some of the best baked goods - pastries, cakes, muffins, bagels, breads, the works - it’s also a gathering place,” Squillante said. “We’ve brought the whole place in with more tables and made it cozier. It’s really on its way to becoming a real community meeting group.”

Since taking over the business about three and a half months ago, Squillante said business has increased by nearly 30%. A Sunday brunch, live guitar music and an expanded menu have all played a part in that growth. The kitchen now turns out breakfast from 6 a.m. – egg sandwiches, omelets, burritos- and then switches to hearty lunches around 11:30 a.m.

“Big fat sandwiches,” Squillante called them

proudly.

At the same time, the bakery keeps its sweet side alive.

“Of course, you know, the classic apple fritters and apple cinnamon donuts, pumpkin cheesecake, apple-laced cheesecake,” she said. “And now we’ve started with the pies – the pumpkins, the apples – and those have gone wild.”

Her enthusiasm for both food and people radiates through the shop.

“I want the customers to feel like you’re not coming to a bakery,” Squillante said. “You’re coming to my place, and you’re welcome here.”

Part of what makes the place special is her team. She beams when listing their names: pastry chef Sebastian, head baker Billy, breakfast chef Nancy, sous chef J.R. and lunch cook Lester. “They’re great to work with,” she said. “They were anxious for new owners; not that there was anything wrong with the old owner - but they were anxious for a fresh start.”

At the front counter, Anya Katya, a young barista with an easy smile, steams milk for a latte. She’s also the bakery’s unofficial social media manager.

“I started last week [inside], but I’ve been working probably for like the last month or so on social media,” she said.

Katya runs her own company, Anya Katya Media, which specializes in photography and content for small businesses. She explained how her friendship with Squillante led to her joining the team.

“Once I started taking photos here, I kind of got the vibe a little bit,” she said. “I was a barista for the last six years, so I kind of thought, hey, I might as well.”

Katya’s creativity and coffee skills fit right in.

“Sandy is just very personable, which is nice,” Katya said. “She really takes the time to get to know everyone individually, and she knows our strengths. We can kind of build on each other. Like, say, I have an idea – she’s like, ‘Okay, why don’t we work with the bakery side of things to make this drink possible?’ We’re going to do a homemade apple syrup so that we can make caramel apple lattes.”

She laughed, eyes bright. “That’s probably my favorite part – having her knowledge and then building up on that.”

Katya’s goal is to help the bakery grow among younger customers. “I think it has the potential to be something super special,” she said. “It’s always nice to have a little cafe you can go to.”

Across the room, a man and a woman settle into a table near the window, steaming cups in front of them. Blase Skully, a first-time customer, and Samantha Tanguay, a longtime customer, are big fans of the new ownership. “You’re about to witness my first bite of anything that I’ve ever bought from here,” Skully said with a grin. He dove headfirst into his portobello melt, grinning and nodding his head as he pulled back with a mouthful of tasty goodness.

Just the facts: Water rates stayed flat. Thanks to grants and consolidating operations, we are improving service, protecting our drinking water, and saving ratepayers money. The largest driver in the sewer budget was due to a \$161,651 increase in the regional Joint Sewer Facility Maintenance passed through from the regional joint facilities for the 1980s aging sewer treatment plant.

The town and BOE budgets have been passed by an overwhelming majority of Colchester residents for the past two years on the first referendum ('24-25 and '25-26 budgets), moving our town forward.

Just the facts: In 2024-25 the town budget saw increases due to the deficits in the 2023-24 budget (underfunding of pension contributions, FICA, 401a contributions, service contracts and municipal insurance) that was prepared and created by the previous administration.

Just the facts: The 2025-26 saw significant revenue loss due to state legislation, increases in health insurance, energy costs, and wage inflation but offset increases with new efficiencies and \$5 million in grants, use of the cannabis tax revenue, and strategic use of reserves to protect taxpayers. These efforts result in Colchester delivering a lower tax rate than neighboring towns like Hebron, Marlborough, and East Hampton.

I'm proud and honored to be part of the Democratic team led by First Selectman Bernie Dennler, a team that relies on the facts and personal integrity in following the rules of the town to make sound and concrete decisions. Three weeks ago, Shannon Nazario submitted an LTE. She shared with me the version she actually submitted to the paper in which elements that would’ve given more context to support her public statement of not supporting John Thomas, Republican running for first selectman of Colchester, were edited out. They notified her they would be raising her rent by nearly 25% in 2024. This sudden 25% raising of the rent made it financially difficult for her to remain a tenant and she vacated the rental by 5/1/24. I helped her clean some of the apartment and move. They did not return her security deposit and the accrued interest when she inquired about it during multiple conversations, which were futile. To fight to get her deposit, she was forced to file a small claims case with the New London Superior Court. Case Detail - KNL-CV24-5025489-S. The outcome resulted in a court order issued on 5/22/25. Here’s an excerpt: “This court finds that the defendants were not justified in retaining the Plaintiff’s security deposit. As such, this court orders that the defendants return the \$1,000 to the Plaintiff, plus interest earned on that deposit, during the period of tenancy, on or before June 23, 2025.”

Fast forward to today. They haven’t complied with the court order. She now has to seek further legal action. Where’s the integrity and accountability that John Thomas claims he’s running on? He claims to be a man of God. What comes to my mind is the biblical phrase “Get your house in order.” You decide for yourself what you look for in a candidate. For me, even as a Republican, this one is a hard pass.

It feels like a lifetime! But it has only been three years since Mom moved out of her own house... forever. Never to return. Leaving behind her quilting supplies, precious artifacts from her family past, well-worn cookbooks, favorite mugs, the list goes on.

In a blink of an eye, three years was just “poof” gone. Recently I had to stop and really think hard about how long it really was that she moved into her first assisted living community. This is because mom has changed so much since she moved out of the house next door in 2022. I said to myself, “It has to be longer than three years! Surely it is longer than that!”

Time is precious. It needs to be savored. Time is one thing you will never regain.

I recall when Mom’s geriatric doctor recommended that we take Mom off her dementia medicine last year; the doctor said that it likely isn’t adding any value at her stage of Alzheimer’s. So we did. We trusted the clinical recommendation. Mom declined so fast after we did that. I was working so much and didn’t connect the dots until several weeks later after reaching out to my “dementia family.”

We found out that patients who are benefiting from the drug, when taken off of it, will decline to where they would have been had they never been on the drug in the first place. We had her go back on the medicine. I called the doctor’s office and told the nurse that they had taken time away from us and that they need to be more forthright with side effects and possible ramifications. No longer am I afraid to challenge clinicians.

Please learn from my mistakes. I know that I need to ask more questions – always ask questions ad nauseum. Leave no rock turned.

Some say all we have is time. I say that time is too precious to waste on waiting, second guessing, regrets, “what if’s” or keeping things to myself.

Know you are not alone.

More from Hebron’s Mother Trees

To the Editor:

Hebron’s latest entry in the Connecticut Notable Tree Database, hosted by the Connecticut College Arboretum, is the Shagbark Hickory (*Carya ovata*) nicknamed “Mother Hickory.” The name is a tribute to the intriguing work by the noted forest ecologist Suzanne Simard, who published “Finding the Mother Tree” in 2021. Through decades of research, Dr. Simard has discovered amazing new facts about the life of trees: “I conducted hundreds of experiments, with one discovery leading to the next, and through this quest I uncovered the lessons of tree-to-tree communication, of the relationships that create a forest society. The evidence was at first highly controversial, but the science is now known to be rigorous, peer-reviewed, and widely published.” The research documents the interconnected relationships of the oldest trees in the forest, the Mother Trees, with the surrounding trees and the underground world of mycelial fungus, offering deep insights into forest society and our own.

Dr. Simard explains the parallels between trees and people, “Ecosystems are so similar to human societies – they’re built on relationships. The stronger those are, the more resilient the system. And since our world’s systems are composed of individual organisms, they have the capacity to change. We creatures adapt, our genes evolve, and we can learn from experience. A system is ever-changing because its parts – the trees and fungi and people – are constantly responding to one another and to the environment. Our success in coevolution – our success as a productive society – is only as good as the strength of these bonds with other individuals and species. Out of the resulting adaptation and evolution emerge behaviors that help us survive, grow, and thrive.”

Three important Mother Trees, including Mother Hickory, are located in the one area of Hebron Center at 17 Kinney Rd. and known as the Horton Property. Lessons from the Mother Trees can show Hebron how to survive, grow and thrive. It is through the strength of our bonds with each other and the natural world that we can find success. Preserving the property at 17 Kinney Rd. offers a rare opportunity for advancing local education, environmental protection and sustainable economic growth through eco-tourism. 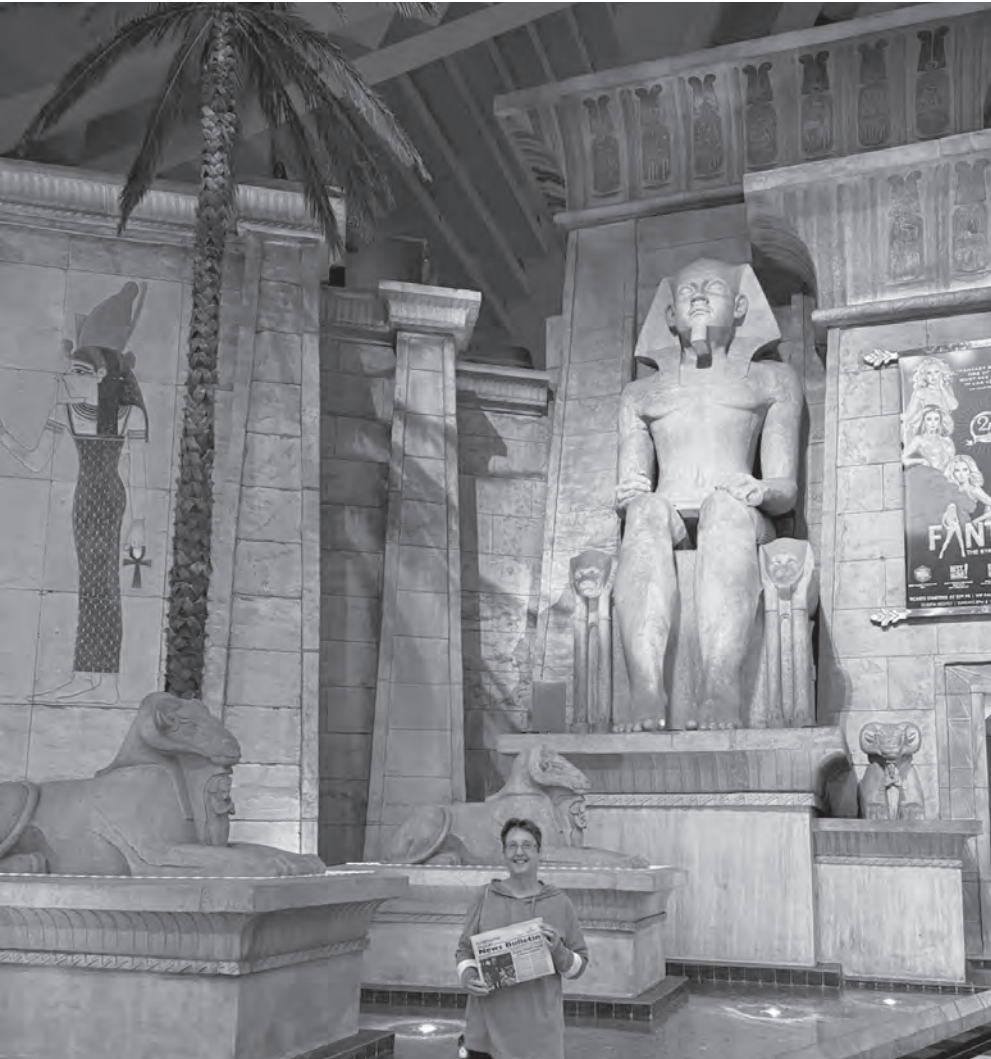

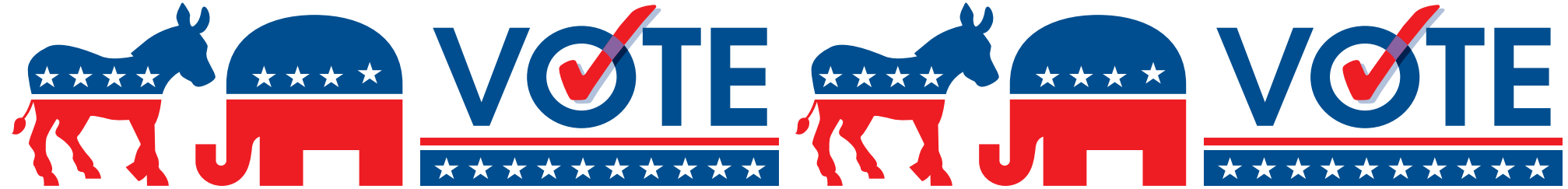
