Belldtown Set to Vote Again on Budget

East Hampton residents will again vote on proposed town and education budgets next month at a July 14 town-wide referendum. The revised budgets will be discussed the week before at a town meeting on Tuesday, July 7, at 5:30 p.m.

The Board of Finance had its work cut out for it in cutting the already lean budget this past week. The board held a special meeting on Monday, June 22 to continue their work to make cuts and negotiate compromises. In the end, they managed to cut the town's general operating budget down to \$19,699,909, which is \$601,595 less than the previously proposed (and voter-rejected) \$20,301,504 budget. The Board of Finance also proposed a \$250,000 reduction to the Board of Education's 2026-27 budget, bringing its total down to \$39,900,937.

At this week's Tuesday night Town Council meeting, the council voted 5-2 along party lines to approve both budgets and the town's capital improvements plan, totaling \$2,364,530, sending all of them to town-wide referendum. Republicans Ted Hintz and Tim Feegel voted against the proposed budgets and capital improvements plan.

The Board of Finance's changes to the town's operating budget came from several cuts, including: eliminating a part-time second driver position at the senior center; eliminating the additional clerical position in the Land Use/Building Department (but still leaving the Assistant Planner/Land Use Enforcement position); cutting the transfer station's operating days down to two days per month (from four); charging a larger portion of the Parks and Recreation Department's Program Coordinator position back to programs; and cutting back slightly on the town's "contingency" fund.

Much of the savings also came from an approximate \$500,000 reduction in the contribution to the Capital Reserve Fund. The budget passed the Board of Finance along party lines with a 5-2 vote. Republicans Alison Walck and David Radavich voted against the budget.

The Board of Finance also voted along party lines to approve the Capital Improvements Plan, with \$28,000 of the Co. 3 Parking Lot and Concrete Apron project re-allocated to help cover the cost of the Fire Department's new fire command vehicle, thereby reducing how much of it will need to be financed.

AHM is 'Here 4 You' With New Podcast

Families today are busier than they ever have been, but that does not mean they have fewer questions about raising children. From mental health and substance use to social media and school stress, parents and caregivers are always looking for trusted advice. AHM Youth and Family Services hopes to make that easier with the launch of its new video podcast, "Here 4 You."

The podcast aims to provide expert information that families can access anytime. Episodes are available on YouTube and Spotify, with links shared through AHM's social media and website. The '4' in the show's title represent the four towns AHM serves: Andover, Hebron, Marlborough and Columbia.

"We really sat back and said, okay, what can we do to get this important information out but in a way that is easily accessible?" said AHM Executive Director Tressa Giordano. "We came up with the thought of a podcast and know that podcasts are pretty popular and successful."

AHM created the show and is filmed with the Community Voice Channel in Bolton. Funding comes through Amplify's State Opioid Response grant, along with support from the Cherish the Children Foundation and the Kyle Constantine Memorial Initiative.

Unlike many podcasts, "Here 4 You" is both audio and video.

"We decided when we went into this, that we

not only wanted it to be audio, but we wanted it also to be visual," Giordano said. "So it's a video podcast. You can either watch it on YouTube or you can listen to it on Spotify." She said adding a visual component helps viewers connect with the people behind the information.

"We really wanted to put a face to some of the names and the guests that are on the show and bring that to life for folks and really help them to understand how friendly and warm and approachable the staff at AHM are," she said.

The idea grew out of a challenge many organizations face. While AHM has hosted speakers and community forums in the past, busy schedules have often made attendance difficult.

"Families, parents, perhaps grandparents that are raising children in the area are extremely busy," Giordano said. "But there is still a want and a need for important information on a broad spectrum of topics."

Rather than requiring people to attend an event at a certain time, the podcast allows them to listen whenever it fits their schedule.

"At the end of the day, we just want to get information out to families that is useful and helpful," said Giordano. "Parents and caregivers do want to have that information, but just sometimes struggle with finding the time to physically go to an event."

Giordano explained that episodes are designed to fit easily into daily life.

"We try to keep our episodes between 30 and

There’s a new bald eagle nest on Lake Pocotopaug – and last weekend, the town’s Lake Commission shared it had received some guidance from the state Department of Energy & Environmental Protection on just how to handle it.

According to the Lake Commission, young eagles are expected to remain in the nest through early July, and loud, unpredictable disturbances can cause them to leave the nest before they are ready to fly – a situation that can lead to serious injury or death, the commission said.

Therefore – as per the suggestion of DEEP – the commission is asking lake residents, and those visiting the lake, to avoid shooting off fireworks on or around the lake until after July 15.

And that’s where I’m skeptical. Oh, I hope people follow that guidance, but.....will they?

There’s a pretty big holiday happening 11 days before July 15; some of you might have heard of it. People set off fireworks at Lake Pocotopaug every Fourth, and this year is going to be America250. A very big deal. And you want people to wait until nearly two weeks after the Fourth to light up the night sky?

Look, I hope they do; as the Lake Commission said, the only reason the bald eagle nest is there in the first place is because the

community “has worked together to be better stewards of Lake Pocotopaug.” I just don’t know how realistic it is to expect people to hold back.

I hope they do, though. There will be plenty – *plenty* – of other opportunities in other towns to see fireworks on Fourth of July weekend, and hopefully lake residents will take advantage of those. Let’s give those baby eagles a fighting chance.

Bulletin Board

If you watch or read the news on a regular basis, you’re probably aware of the latest terror facing Connecticut residents.

Ticks.

As in bugs.

Malignant blood-sucking, disease-carrying bugs.

According to recent news reports, the threat of being dismembered by a serial killer, or flattened by a hit and run driver or finding a severed finger in your chili (all of which appear to occur on a regular basis in places like California, according to my readings on the internet) all pale in comparison to the peril posed by Connecticut ticks.

Now, I’m no Daniel Boone, but I do spend a lot of time in the woods. And over the years I’ve pulled dozens of ticks off myself. If anybody should have had Lyme disease, it’s me. But I’ve never tested positive. On the other hand, Son #1, who lives in Boston and spends most of his time in pool halls as far as I can determine, has had Lyme disease twice. Go figure.

But it pays to be wary. This summer is supposed to be one of the worst ever for ticks in Connecticut. As if swarms of mosquitoes carrying the West Nile virus and encephalitis aren’t enough to worry about, now we’re facing unprecedented ground attacks from hordes of disease-ridden ticks.

So far this month, I have found two ticks crawling on my body – one after going out to get the mail (me, not the tick) and the other while I was feigning interest in some overpriced plant my wife had just installed in her garden. This indicates to me that those nefarious ticks are no longer confining their activities to the wilderness. I imagine it is only a matter of time before they begin disguising themselves as DoorDash delivery people or Uber drivers, hoping to get close enough to leap on unwary victims and sink their pointy little teeth or beaks or suckers or whatever into our tender flesh.

But don’t despair. As the old saying goes: knowledge is power.

According to a very informative news article about the proliferation of ticks in Connecticut this year, there are a number of precautions you can take to avoid becoming a victim. As I understand it (reading between the lines, anyway) the most effective defense would be to just stay inside the house all summer. While I understand the attraction of spending endless days on the couch watching television, this strikes me as a flawed strategy. I mean, all the ticks have to do is sit outside and wait. Sooner or later you’re going to need toilet paper or run out of beer or somebody (you know who) is going to demand that you mow the lawn. The ticks just need to be patient.

Given that, and assuming you would prefer not to spend the entire summer cowering in the house clutching a can of bug spray, there are other precautions you can take to avoid tick attacks, according to the Centers for Disease Control. Perhaps the simplest is to cover up by wearing long sleeves and tucking your long pants into your socks. This narrows the target area to your face and eyes. It is also possible that ticks don’t gravitate toward people suffering from heat stroke or maybe they think anybody who dresses like an Eskimo in the middle of the summer has mental health issues.

Another tip (possibly sponsored by Eversource) suggests that when you come in from outdoors, you take off all your clothes and put them in the dryer on high heat for ten minutes. While I like the idea of broiling the little vermin – in fact, I like it so much I’d be inclined to roast them for a full 20 minutes – I think this could get to be a hassle if you go in and out of the house more than a couple of times a day.

Still another precaution, which makes more sense to me, advises taking a shower within two hours of coming indoors. I guess the theory is that a tick can’t bite you while it’s being washed, screaming, down the drain. It occurs to me that showering might also be appreciated by your housemates if you’ve been wandering around outside in 90-degree heat in a long-sleeved shirt with your pants tucked into your socks.

Finally, just to be on the safe side, the experts suggest that you conduct a full body check upon returning from potentially tick-infested areas, using a hand-held or full-length mirror to view all parts of your body. That’s right. All parts.

Of course, if (like me), you no longer recognize that debilitated old coot in the mirror, you might prefer to risk Lyme disease.

Officially Salty

Colchester voters rejected the budgets by nearly two-to-one. The message was simple: spending is too high.
The Board of Finance responded by cutting \$1.5 million from the Board of Education budget and only \$167,890 from town departments. That is nearly a 9-to-1 ratio.
After years of large town-side increases under First Selectman Bernie Dennler, Town Hall was protected while the schools took the hit.

And what did residents get? A budget that still increases by about 5.1% over last year.
They did not cut spending. They cut a failed increase.
Then came the petty part: cutting the public sand/salt pile to save just \$5,000.
Republican John Thomas was right to object. Eliminating a basic winter safety service for a rounding error in a \$69 million budget does not solve the budget problem. It just punishes residents for voting ‘no.’
Colchester officials may be salty about the referendum result, but taxpayers are the ones paying the bills.

Taxpayers Were Ignored
To the Editor:
At Monday’s Board of Finance meeting, the Democratic majority once again chose not to listen to the taxpayers. Republican members proposed a \$10 million road reconstruction bonding program that would allow the town to make meaningful progress addressing East Hampton’s deteriorating roads. The proposal would have enabled the town to reconstruct many roads in a timely and cost-effective manner by utilizing contractors through existing state bid arrangements, accelerating improvements while controlling costs. Rather than embracing a long-term solution to one of the most common concerns expressed by residents, the Democratic majority rejected the proposal and instead voted to reduce road funding in the town budget.
Even more troubling was the board’s treatment of the Board of Education budget. The school budget was rejected by voters by a substantial margin at referendum. Yet instead of making meaningful changes that reflected the concerns expressed by taxpayers, the board reduced the budget by only \$250,000, a token reduction. Some members suggested that they were not bound by the referendum result and that they also represented residents who chose

not to vote. While elected officials certainly represent all residents, the referendum is the one opportunity taxpayers have to directly express their views. When voters take the time to participate and deliver a clear message, that message deserves more than a symbolic response. The result is a budget process that appears to place greater weight on assumptions about those who stayed home than on the voices of those who actually participated.

Taxpayers deserved a serious reconsideration of the school budget and a serious plan to improve our roads. Unfortunately, they received neither.

A Mistake was Made

To the Editor:
I will begin by acknowledging the Hebron Town Council members for their dedication, hard work, and courage to serve. After two budget rejections and under the pressure to make additional cuts, I believe a mistake was made. With the above attributes noted, a hasty decision and lack of understanding of the impact on our seniors resulted in the elimination of the senior center receptionist's position.

This action, in my opinion, opens our town to possible legal action coming from HIPAA violations regarding confidentiality on Medicare and Medicaid information. Our seniors provide this information and it's used within this position. There is a difference in having a well-trained town employee versus well-meaning but perhaps gossip-prone volunteers. Saving \$15,000 in a budget reduction, only to have the town spend thousands to defend just one HIPAA lawsuit...

We also risk complaints filed with the state for mistakes on applications for various senior services (again, supported by this position) that can result in delays or denial to access. Inconsistency is the big issue using volunteers.

Scheduling transportation for homebound seniors using the Dial-a-Ride program is also supported by this position. Making appointment additions, changes, cancellations, with accuracy are all critical needs to manage this. A

mistake and missed appointment can cause a delay of weeks for much needed medical care.

To my knowledge, none of our Town Council members have toured the senior center and may not understand the extent of services offered. (Exception – kudos to Sean Fitzpatrick for recently taking the time to tour the Senior Center...sadly, after the position was cut.)

Currently, 2,600 seniors aged 60 and over are served by our Senior Center (about 30% of our town population). Average daily phone call activity 50 to 75 calls. Seniors are far more likely to resolve questions, problems or other issues by phone. There are three paid staff positions: Senior Services Director and Municipal Agent for the Elderly (combined) / Program Director / Adult and Senior Social Services Worker. The receptionist assists all three staff members.

It's not a position that just answers the phone. I believe that our seniors deserve better than getting voicemail, or a volunteer to access Senior Services for the help they need. For the very small impact on our budget (\$15,000), the Hebron Town Council needs to find the same commitment and courage that I acknowledged earlier in this letter, to correct this mistake and reinstate this position.

As in many modern-day offices, doing more with less is customary and it is true at the senior center as well! Technology assistance for Zoom exercise class, table set up and breakdown for programs and meetings, delivering meals on

wheels (heating up those meals!) are all part of Dennis' day! Now will be added, answering the phone when it rings to schedule Dial-A-Ride for medical appointments, registering people for one of the many programs offered there or other services and information provided by the senior center staff. Does this additional task effectively utilize Hebron's adult/senior social worker? I know the answer! Do you?

I voted 'no' in the first budget referendum; cuts needed to be made. Eliminating the receptionist at the senior center, for \$15,775 annual savings, was irrational and uninformed. Older adults much prefer using the phone to reach out for help when they need it (and no we can't change that). Please restore our receptionist so someone is there to answer their call!

Disappointed in Weir's Vote

To the Editor:
Earlier this year, millions of Americans were shocked and outraged by the scenes of masked, unidentified federal agents brutally seizing and, in some instances, shooting members of the community in Minnesota. Polls show that the vast majority of Americans reject this kind of lawless, violent behavior and want the immigration laws to be enforced by federal agents who receive the proper training and are directed by their superiors to respect the civil and constitutional rights of U.S. citizens and immigrants.

These were the goals that were embodied in a recently-enacted Connecticut law called SB397. SB397 creates "protected areas" like schools, hospitals and churches where federal agents cannot arrest people for violations of immigration law unless they have an arrest warrant issued by a judge. It prohibits agents from wearing masks (unless they are working undercover or outdoors in freezing temperatures) and requires them to wear identification (again, unless they are undercover). It fills a gap in the law by creating a right to sue federal agents in state court if they violate a person's constitutional rights. It also imposes stricter training requirements for law enforcement officers and bans police departments in Connecticut from hiring former Federal agents who were found guilty of

misconduct. Finally, SB397 restricts the amount of time that data from automatic license plate readers can be retained to 21 days and bans the use of that data in connection with investigating acts of protected speech, immigration enforcement and reproductive and transgender healthcare.

SB397 is not "anti-police" or "anti-ICE." It is a common sense reaction to the abuses millions of Americans witnessed on the streets of Minneapolis. I think we can all agree that we want a nation where the laws are enforced, including the immigration laws. But those who are entrusted with the enforcement of the laws should also behave in accordance with those laws.

That is why I am disappointed that the 55th District's representative, Steve Weir (R), voted against SB397. The 55th District (covering Andover, Bolton, Hebron, Marlborough, and portions of Glastonbury) needs a representative who strikes the right balance, and that is why I will be voting for Ellen Paul for the 55th District in November. I hope you will too.

New Vision for Hebron

To the Editor:
Hebron's residents and Town Hall have a rare opportunity to embrace a dramatic new vision that can propel our town forward. Last week the Planning and Zoning Commission held a "Listening Session" and invited the public to "Help Shape the Future of Hebron Town Center." The large crowd offered thoughtful suggestions of certain business they would like to see in town. Ideas included a healthcare center, an assisted living facility, a nature center and a record store. However, the opportunity that Hebron has in front of us offers a chance to act boldly and create a new future. With little investment and potential for tremendous economic and cultural return, we can engage with the thriving multi-billion dollar outdoor recreation and ecotourism economy. The 53 acres of town owned land at 17 Kinney Rd./the Horton property are an environmental and historic treasure that can draw visitors from across the region.

At the Listening Session I shared the economic numbers; in 2023 the U.S. Department of Commerce reported the outdoor recreation industry generated \$4.6 billion in Connecticut, and in 2022 the University of Connecticut reported agriculture contributes \$4 billion to the state economy. After the meeting I was made aware of more recent numbers and they are even more impressive. In 2024, the U.S. Department of Commerce reported that the outdoor recreation industry generated \$6 billion a year in Connecticut alone! That is a \$2 billion dollar increase in just one year, clearly an important economic trend.

Fortunately, the Planning and Zoning Commission has already established a comprehensive road map on how to engage with this thriving economic engine. It's called the 2024 Plan of Conservation and Development. In Section 2, Part A, "Sustainability," the report notes, "The key to achieving a sustainable community and sustainable development is to understand the relationship among three concepts – environmental sustainability, economic sustainability, and social sustainability." This is underscored by Section 2, Part I, "Areas of Historical Heritage,"

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which has as a stated goal: “Locate, document, protect and preserve Hebron’s rich, historic heritage for the education, enrichment and enjoyment of all citizens and promote the environmental, economic, and cultural benefits of historic preservation.” Without doubt the creation of an outdoor environmental and history classroom at 17 Kinney Rd. embraces these elements of the POCD. Significant Sacrifices

To the Editor:
On Thursday evening, the Colchester Board of Finance voted to move forward with a \$1.5 million reduction to the Board of Education budget and a \$168,000 reduction to the town budget. No doubt, supporters of a “no” vote will argue that these reductions are insufficient and that the Board of Finance is not listening to residents.

That argument overlooks an important fact: this is the largest budget reduction in response to a failed referendum that Colchester has seen. Those advocating for significant cuts have consistently called for reductions in Board of Education administration. This revised proposal eliminates two administrative positions and includes a pay freeze for the remaining district administrators.

In addition, the teachers’ union felt so strongly about preserving teaching positions and student programs that its members agreed to unpaid furlough days, resulting in a \$294,000 reduction. That represents a direct financial sacrifice by educators in support of our children and schools. The proposal also eliminates world language instruction at the middle school level. Taken together, these are meaningful reductions, and I would argue that they are enough.

On the town side, most of the reductions also come from voluntary unpaid furlough days taken by employees. Other cuts include \$10,000 from library books and supplies, the elimination of a seasonal groundskeeper position, \$30,000 from road improvements, and several other miscellaneous reductions.

What stood out during the discussion was that Board of Finance member John Thomas expressed particular concern about the elimination of the town’s winter salt pile for residents. He noted that he uses the salt pile himself and knows others who do as well, and suggested that the \$5,000 allocated for that service should be restored. He further stated that he did not believe the town budget should be reduced by even one penny and ultimately voted against forwarding the proposed \$168,000 reduction to voters.

Residents can draw their own conclusions about that vote. What is clear is that town employees, teachers, administrators, students, and

residents are all being asked to absorb the impact of these reductions. The revised budget reflects difficult compromises and significant sacrifices across multiple areas of town government and education.

The Town of Hebron recently passed their budget on the third referendum, by then requiring many cuts on spending. As the saying goes “the little things are the big things.”

As one of the 2,500 seniors 60+ years old, 25% of the population in Hebron, I’d like to highlight one of the seemingly small cuts, a savings of less than \$16,000, by eliminating the position of the receptionist/clerical support position at the Senior Center. This “small” cut will have a big impact.

One of the many tasks assigned to this position beyond answering the phones, is to channel calls where they can best be addressed, including scheduling rides to appointments for our seniors who are without transportation. This, of course, takes attention to detail for proper arranging, with an available vehicle and available driver. Additionally, every encounter with the senior center exposes them to more of the many services our center has to offer.

In addition to the senior having the need for a ride, for many of the town’s seniors, that ride may be their only socialization and form of connection throughout their day. Studies have shown socialization improves cognitive health, mood and physical well-being in seniors. Isolation increases risk of depression, dementia and chronic illness. So, it is also significantly important that this phone call be unrushed so the ambassador for the senior center can share a meaningful conversation with the caller.

To deny this complex, multi-step process from running smoothly and flawlessly by eliminating this crucial position, is to jeopardize the physical, mental and social health of our valuable aging and too often neglected senior population.

The Monster Behind the Math

To The Editor:
At a recent public meeting, Andover’s First Selectman warned residents about a “monster number”: he said it costs about \$34,000 a year to send each Andover child to RHAM, and suggested that I, as a member of the RHAM Board of Education, should be focusing on it.

I am glad to focus on what RHAM costs. I am also glad to turn on the light, because this particular monster does not survive it.

The arithmetic is something any resident can do. RHAM’s entire budget this year is \$32,620,072, and the district enrolls 1,078 students. Divide the first by the second and you get \$30,261 per student. That figure includes everything: salaries, buildings, buses, and debt service, spread across every child in the district. It is the largest the per-student number can possibly be. The first selectman’s \$34,000 exceeds even that maximum, which is another way of saying it cannot be real.

You reach the same place doing it Andover-only. Our town’s RHAM assessment this year is \$4,237,348, and we send 140 students. Dividing one by the other gives the same figure, give or take a rounding difference. The two methods agree because each town’s bill is set in proportion to its enrollment.

The state’s official measure, which Connecticut calculates the same way for every district, is lower still: \$27,181 per pupil in operating cost. By that measure, only two of the eight comparable regional districts in the state spend less per pupil than RHAM.

None of this means RHAM is cheap, and I will not pretend otherwise. Its per-pupil cost has climbed sharply over the past decade. But the climb is mostly because enrollment fell by more than a third, not because spending grew. RHAM’s total budget rose more slowly than inflation. I lay all of this out, with primary sources, in a report at andoverct.info/reports/rham/per-pupil.

Some will ask why I did not say this while the budget was before the voters. I sit on the RHAM board, and I make a deliberate choice to stay out of the public argument over the budget, in either direction. I do not believe anyone holding a seat should put a thumb on the scale of a live

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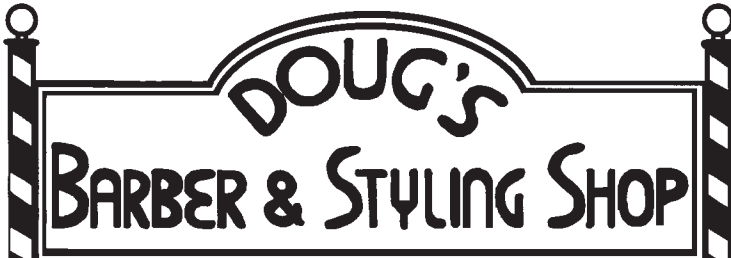
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Goats, Snakes, Raccoons – and Retirement

After 45 years in law enforcement and public safety, Jay Kehoe has finally hung up his badge. But if you ask the residents of Marlborough, they will tell you that Kehoe was much more than a police officer. He was a neighbor, a friend, a problem solver and sometimes even the town's unofficial animal wrangler.

Kehoe retired as Marlborough's director of public safety after serving the town for 21 years. Before that, he spent two decades with the Glastonbury Police Department, where he retired as a lieutenant. Along the way, he helped create regional dive teams and tactical teams and became a respected trainer and mentor.

What makes a legacy, though, is not the titles or awards but the man himself.

"He really personifies what a police officer, and the town director of public safety should be," said resident Mary Quirk. "He's a father, he's a husband, he's now a granddad. And his face lights up when he talks about the grandchildren and his family."

Quirk said Kehoe became "part of the fabric of our town."

That was especially true for seniors. Over the years, Kehoe answered wellness calls, checked on particular vulnerable residents and connected people with resources they might not have known existed.

"He knows them personally," Quirk said. "He knows the local resources as well as the state resources that somebody may need and not know about."

And if there was an unusual emergency, chances were Kehoe had seen it before.

One of Quirk's favorite stories began with a phone call from a woman in her 80s. "She says, 'Mary, the goats just broke my window.'" Quirk admitted she was quite confused. "I actually

looked at the phone, and I go, 'Did she just say goats and her window?' So I'm thinking, did she say ghosts?" Nope. It was indeed goats. Lots of them.

The animals had smashed windows and taken over the property. Quirk called Fire Marshal Joe Asklar, who quickly decided the situation required another expert. "Mary, call Jay," he told her.

Kehoe arrived, looked over the scene and calmly announced, "Mary, I got this. You can go." Quirk laughed and said, "I guess this isn't his first goat rodeo."

Years later, Kehoe was reminded of the event and laughed. "They were breaking windows in the house," he recalled. "They stole one of the roofer's jackets and they were chewing it up. They were just being goats, you know?"

Instead of chasing them, Kehoe used a clever trick. "I put a couple pebbles in the bottom of a galvanized bucket, and I shook it and they thought I had food," he said. The goats happily followed him to a nearby pen. "It wasn't the right house," he admitted, "but, well, they had to be contained."

Eventually, he said, everyone "lived happily ever after." Quirk now jokes that Kehoe is "the real GOAT - the greatest of all time."

Goats, however, are only one part of the story. Asklar remembers that Kehoe was the town's snake expert. "He brought with him a tremendous amount of knowledge on rattlesnakes and other reptiles," said Asklar. "Anytime there was a snake problem, we called Jay Kehoe."

Kehoe's love of reptiles started when he was young. He grew up in Florida, and his mother told him half the snakes in the south were poisonous, so he couldn't play with them. After moving from Florida to Connecticut, his mother told him, "there's no poisonous snakes here, you can play with them now." So off he went.



State Sen. Cathy Osten (D-19) recently presented Jay Kehoe an official statement from Gov. Ned Lamont that congratulated Kehoe on his retirement after 45 years of dedicated service to the state of Connecticut and the residents of Marlborough.

For more than 30 years, Kehoe helped study endangered timber rattlesnakes by capturing, measuring and tagging them. He even remembered one snake decades later when a UPS driver accidentally ran it over.

"He says, 'Jay, I just ran over one of your snakes.' And I had that snake 28 years ago," Kehoe shared.

Kehoe has seen all kinds of wildlife emergencies. One even involved a rabid raccoon chasing a woman.

"She comes running for her life as a raccoon is chasing her," he said. "She jumps on to the [animal control officer's car], dents the hell out of the car, but she got away from the raccoon." There was just one detail that made the story even better. "That also happened to be my wife too," he said with a laugh.

Another time, an officer proudly brought a giant snapping turtle back to the station in his patrol car.

"The thing is in this car, tearing the seats apart," Kehoe recalled. He looked at the officer and asked, "Show me your hands." Thankfully, the officer still had all his fingers, which is not a given when it comes to snapping turtles.

Besides his knowledge and sense of humor, friends say Kehoe was always available when people needed him. Asklar summed it up in one word - "accessibility."

If a situation ever arose, Asklar said he "was able to pick up the phone and discuss the issue, and either get a solution right away or at least have something in place." Even on his days off, Kehoe often answered messages.

"He didn't have to, but he did," Quirk said. "That was appreciated."

When residents needed advice on home safety, Kehoe came to their homes. When he and his wife had extra vegetables that they grew,

they shared. He was known for stopping to talk with people and waving back when they waved to him.

As for retirement, Kehoe is not slowing down. He still teaches police officers, enjoys gardening and motorcycles and occasionally hops into a friend's helicopter. "There's only one thing better than owning your own helicopter," he joked. "Having a friend that owns a helicopter."

However, he said that, according to his wife, his biggest project is much closer to home.

"The major thrust of my retirement," he said, "is to build a new chicken house behind our house." It won't be just any chicken house, either. "A chicken palace," he called it.

Looking back on his career, Kehoe shared a message with everyone he worked for and worked with: "I want to thank the residents of Marlborough for the great second half of my career."

This year, the race starts at 10 a.m. on the shoals off the south end of Gildersleeve Island (hug the eastern shore for the fastest route!), and finishes at Birdon Marina, 37 Riverview St. Distance is approximately 3.6 to 4 miles down the scenic Connecticut River

There will be a Captains’ Meeting (mandatory for registration) on Saturday, July 11, at 10 a.m., at Birdon Marina

Expect a festive atmosphere at the finish line with live music, food, awards, and plenty of shore-side cheering. All proceeds from the race — a 501(c)(3) nonprofit — benefit local children’s charities in the Portland and Middletown area.

To participate, there needs to be a minimum crew of three people per raft. Minimum raft size is 4’x 8’ at the waterline. Rafts must be 100% homemade; no commercial hulls. Use foam,

plastic barrels, buckets, scrap wood, or recycled materials. Rafts must be human-powered only (paddles, oars, poles, sails, pedal power — get creative!). Life jackets (Coast Guard-approved) are required and must be worn at all times. Sneakers or appropriate footwear are also mandatory.

Every raft also needs a support boat, for towing to the start and safety.

Cost is a \$25 donation per crew member. To enter, download the form and hold-harmless agreement from www.ctriverrafttrace.org. Notarize it (a notary will be available at the Captains’ Meeting) and submit with your donation.

The official event booklet and website offer basic and advanced raft-building guides, safety tips, and full rules. Past racers have floated everything from picnic-table rafts to elaborate themed masterpieces.

On the fire side, Fire Chief Robb Rainville described the department’s need for a new command vehicle, noting that the department has gone out of its way to work to reduce costs on the new vehicle. He described the old vehicle, a 2011 Ford Expedition, as having holes in the floor and offered to take board members out for a “tour.” He challenged a board member to “get in the car and out of it without needing a tetanus shot” and said the vehicle’s current state posed both safety and financial risks.

“Just three weeks ago, Chief Swan was responding to a call and he lost his brakes, because his car was rusted,” Rainville said. He said he worried that, if the vehicle were unsafe and would up in an accident, it could cost the town more in the end.

On the education side, the Board of Finance proposed cutting the education budget by \$250,000, with the Republican members again voting against this proposal. The town council later approved the proposal, without Republican support, but the Board of Education will have to determine what cuts will need to be made to meet that end budget.

Board of Education Chair Nancy Kohler, a Democrat, said the board had presented some potential cuts to the community prior to the last referendum, but that final decisions had not yet been made. Some of the programs proposed for potential elimination, including the Beginner Bellringers and Smart Start preschool programs, generated significant community sup-

port after the community became aware that they were under threat.

While the Board of Ed did have potential cuts in mind, said Kohler, “at this time, there have been no decisions on which of those reductions will be made. We have some difficult conversations ahead.”

“We are hopeful that the next referendum will result in a positive outcome so that the district can prepare for the upcoming school year, which will be here before we know it,” she continued. “Once the community approves a final budget, the Board will deliberate and make the necessary reductions.”

At the Town Council meeting, the council also voted unanimously to approve a temporary monthly budget for July 2026, and heard about a change to the Fire Department Length of Service Awards Program, which provides a small pension to the town’s volunteer firefighters. The change in language will help the program comply with tax law and clarify benefits. They also voted unanimously to accept a \$50,000 cybersecurity grant and approved appointments and re-appointments to several committees, including the Inland Wetlands and Watercourse Agency, the Design Review Board, the Ethics Commission, and the Conservation-Lake Commission.

The Town Council will meet next for the town meeting on the proposed budget, followed by their regularly scheduled WPCA meeting, on July 7.

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Selectmen Take First Steps to Discuss Charter Revision

Portland’s Board of Selectman met for a speedy and efficient regular meeting on June 17, but First Selectman Mike Pelton, a Republican, did warn that the board had only one scheduled meeting for all of July. That meeting on July 15, he said, would likely be “packed.”

The board’s agenda took on many small procedural, ceremonial and community-oriented items. It started with the board reading into record a proclamation declaring June 19, 2026 as “Juneteenth Day” in the town and urging “all citizens to become more aware of the significance of this celebration in African American History and in the heritage of our nation, State of Connecticut and Town of Portland.”

Later, Pelton also discussed the Portland Sage Masters, a group organized by resident Beau Doherty, which had participated in a state-wide bird count. Pelton said the group found over 75 birds at a recent event, with many found near Wangunk Meadows. He said that, due to the unique river ecosystem, with tidal flooding, birders from all over New England come to the area.

Pelton and others also spoke about the recent Riverbend Landing ribbon cutting, thanking committee chairs Lou Pear and Rick Scharr. Selectman John Dillon, a Democrat, mentioned how important he thought it had been to have included Wangunk Elder Gary Red Oak O’Neil in the event.

The board also had some general discussions around the idea of a “road diet” on Main Street, which would cut down lanes through part of the

area. Pelton said that the town had been having conversations with the state Department of Transportation about the idea and that he thought it had the potential to reduce the speed of cars passing through, while also increasing available parking spaces and changing the look of the downtown area.

Pelton said town officials had talked about trying to time out the plan around the state’s existing repaving schedule, but that the venture was worth discussing further at upcoming meetings to begin planning.

Andrea Alfano, a Democrat, said she wanted to address the Town Charter revision that had been discussed at previous meetings. Pelton said that the revision process continued to remain an agenda item, but that the town was figuring out costs associated with the revision. The discussion regarding the charter, he said, would be “kicked off” at the upcoming July meeting, with particular consideration given to rules requiring the formal process to be completed within a set window once started.

Still, Alfano said she wanted to make sure that the revision did not get neglected. She said that, after the previous meeting, she had spent some time looking at the charter to see areas that might need changes, and encouraged other members to do the same.

“Be prepared so we can hit the ground running,” she said.

Pelton said he agreed, noting that he already had a list of things he might want to change.

John Dillon, a Democrat, said he thought

that the charter (and a discussion around what needed to change in it), should be an agenda item at the next July meeting, and emphasized the importance of providing some direction to a committee that might start working on it.

“We need to give them some guidance, some areas that we think are important,” he said. “They certainly can find others, but I think we need to give them some guidance.”

“I’m sure a lot of us will have similar things [that we want to revise],” said Alfano, noting that anyone who frequently references the document to use it has encountered some areas in need of revision.

Vinnie Pitruzzello, a Republican, agreed that they should get started on it, saying that he, like Alfano, came prepared to discuss the charter tonight.

“I think the sooner we start noodling on this,

the better we’re gonna be,” Pitruzzello said.

Alfano said that, among her noted charter issues, the distinction between boards, committees and commissions needed attention, as well as the rules regarding public hearings and meetings that discuss the same topics. She said she worried these things were unclear to the public as well.

Alfano also drew concern to majority and minority representation rules, saying, “we need to be thinking about the fact that 40% of voters in Portland are unaffiliated voters.” She said that she worried that that might raise potential challenges when it came to appointing unaffiliated people to boards and commissions.

In the end, the board agreed to arrive prepared to discuss their areas of concern in the charter at the July 15 meeting.

“Everyone’s got their homework,” said Pelton.

From the First Selectman’s Desk

June is usually a busy month in Portland. School winds down, budget season wraps up, summer vacations begin, and Town Hall slows down just a little.

Not this year. It feels like everything is happening at once – in a good way – and I wanted to share a few updates from around town.

Celebrating Our Students: First and foremost, congratulations to the 78 graduates of Portland High School’s Class of 2026. Graduation on June 15 was a wonderful evening despite the occasional 35 mph wind gust! Special congratulations go to our valedictorian, Lillian Gaetani, and salutatorian, Allison Tine, whose speeches were thoughtful and inspiring. I also want to recognize Student Senate President Eunice Ngunjiri, who served as Master of Ceremonies. Her heartfelt remarks about belonging, growth, and family captured the spirit of the evening and left a lasting impression on everyone in attendance.

Immediately afterward, I joined fellow chaperones Mike O’Rourke and Ryan Keating for Project Graduation. We took 60 graduates to the Sports Center in Shelton for an all-night celebration filled with laser tag, ice skating, games, and more. I’ve participated in Project Graduation for more than a decade, and my favorite part always comes near the end of the night. The excitement settles down, and the students begin to realize this may be the last time they’re all together as a class. It’s a bittersweet moment, and one I’m grateful to witness each year.

School’s Out: I also had the opportunity to speak to our remaining high school students on Juneteenth. Despite a few technical difficulties, I was able to share a simple message: we all have the ability – and the responsibility – to make the world a little better through our everyday actions.

Afterward, the students enjoyed popcorn, lemon ices, games, and one last chance to spend time together before summer officially begins. By the time you read this, school will be out, and summer will be underway.

School Renovation Project Moves Forward: The newly formed School Renovation Committee is beginning to take shape. We’ve already received more than 15 applications from residents with expertise in education, construction, finance, and other fields. In addition, our superintendent and his team successfully completed and submitted all of the required paperwork to the state ahead of the June 30 deadline – a significant milestone in moving the project forward.

River Bend Landing Continues to Shine: Portland’s newest park, River Bend Landing, has now been open for about two weeks, and every day more people discover just how special it is. If you haven’t visited yet, stop by at 241 Airline Avenue. Bring a fishing pole, a kayak – or maybe just a latte – and enjoy the river. And between you and me, it might be a pretty good place to watch the Middletown fireworks on June 27.

Around Town: Construction of the East Main Street sidewalks continues and will soon extend past the cemetery toward Spring Street. Work on Main Street has paused temporarily but will resume in the coming weeks.

Our Juneteenth celebration at the middle school was another wonderful community event. One of the highlights for me was hearing Eric Grant, Portland’s first full-time African American police officer, speak about his experiences growing up in Chester and serving our community. His remarks were powerful and resonated deeply with the audience.

The Knights of Columbus Annual Car Show returns Friday, June 26, from 3 to 8 p.m. It’s always a fun event for a great cause.

Water Service Issues: We’ve received several reports of water pressure issues in different parts of town. We’re actively investigating the cause with assistance from our Water and Sewer Department as well as the MDC. If you’re experiencing problems, please call Town Hall or send us a message. We’ll continue to share updates as we learn more.

Economic Development Updates: I’m meeting with the ownership and construction teams from the Nordic Spa this week to get a better sense of the timeline for opening. There continues to be tremendous excitement around this project, and I look forward to sharing more information soon.

Meanwhile, Brainerd Place recently received its Certificate of Occupancy for its second apartment building. As new residents move in, Portland benefits not only from additional tax revenue but also from the increased activity and energy they bring to our local businesses and community.

And speaking of investments in our future, the town was recently awarded a \$634,000 grant for sidewalk and connectivity improvements on High Street. This project complements our upcoming school renovations and continues our efforts to make Portland safer and more walkable. Thank you to state Sen. Norm Needleman and state Rep. Christie Carpino for their support.

A Word About Teamwork: I’d like to close by recognizing the members of our Board of Selectmen: Deputy First Selectman John Dillon, Jim Tripp, Vinny Pitruzzello, Andrea Alfano, Dave Kuzminski and Bobby Hettrick.

We don’t always agree on every issue – and frankly, that’s healthy. But each member takes their responsibilities seriously, comes prepared, and works hard to find common ground. It’s been a pleasure serving alongside them.

Looking Ahead: In the coming months, we’ll be forming an efficiency committee to explore ways to reduce costs and improve town operations. We’ll also begin discussions about traffic safety initiatives, including speed enforcement cameras, a possible road diet on Main Street, and other projects aimed at making our roads safer.

And don’t forget our Farmers Market at Veterans Park Friday, June 26 from 3-7 p.m. The first market of the season was small but mighty, and we’re excited for this next one with more vendors, music, and food.

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Juneteenth Celebrated with Thoughtful Reflection, Calls to Action

Portland celebrated Juneteenth this past weekend with live music, a vendor fair, free ice cream and, most importantly, thoughtful speeches.

Wind pushed the event – held at Portland Middle School – indoors, but vendors set up inside the main entrance area of the school and food trucks set up outside to accommodate guests. The event was organized by the town’s Committee on Solidarity and was the eighth annual Juneteenth event hosted by the town.

Juneteenth commemorates the end of slavery in the United States, celebrating the day, June 19, 1865, when a Union Army general informed enslaved Black Americans in Galveston, Texas, that slavery had been abolished. The holiday is sometimes called “American’s second Independence Day,” and while celebrations of the event date back to the 19th century, the day did not become a federal holiday until 2021.

Portland’s annual celebration featured several speakers, including Barbara Shaw of Voices of Portland, who explained the history behind the holiday to the crowd, and Barbara Roane of Middletown’s Zion First Baptist Church, who gave an opening invocation and later led the crowd in the singing of “Lift Every Voice and Sing.”

First Selectman Mike Pelton, a Republican, offered up a thoughtful speech in which he encouraged unity.

“Sometimes days like this can feel complicated,” he told the small crowd. “We live in a time where people argue constantly – online, on television, even at dinner tables. People are quick to label each other. Quick to assume the worst. Quick to retreat into teams and corners. And for many of us, that can feel exhausting.”

Pelton said that, despite that, he believed that “most people are still good and will do the right thing – whether people are watching or not. Most people still want to belong. Most people still want to feel respected. Most people still want their town, their school, their workplace, their community, and their country to be better than they are today. And that matters, because Juneteenth is not just about remembering a moment in history. ... It’s about remembering what human beings are capable of when we refuse to give up on the idea that things can improve.”

Pelton continued, “Freedom did not arrive all at once. Justice did not arrive all at once. Progress never does. It happens because ordinary people decide to keep moving society forward – one conversation, one action, one act of courage at a time.”

Pelton also encouraged people to recall Martin Luther King Jr.’s famous quote:

“Darkness cannot drive out darkness; only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate; only love can do that”

“That’s not just poetry,” said Pelton. “That’s instruction.”

“Juneteenth reminds us that history can bend toward justice – but only when people are willing to push it there,” he said.

Former Police Officer Shares Story

Eric Grant, a former Portland Police officer, spoke to the crowd about his own experiences growing up in the area, splitting his time between the very different communities of Chester, where he spent most of his time with his immediate family, and Portland, where his grandparents lived.

“My childhood was fully embedded in the all-white community and town of Chester, where

we were the only Black family in town,” he said. At the same time, “I split my childhood, running and playing in the predominantly Black and brown small sections of Portland and in areas of Middletown.”

Grant said, “I lived and learned so much from living in these two racially split worlds, and later on I realized that this was God’s way of preparing me to become the first Black full-time police officer for the town of Portland in 1995.”

By the time he had become a police officer, Grant said, “I had already learned that even though I wore a uniform, carried a gun, and had authority, I was still seen by many Americans as a lowly Black man.”

He shared the experience of traveling to other states while serving in the Connecticut Army National Guard and United States Army and being warned, along with other Black soldiers, to avoid certain areas due to the threat of racism, “despite the uniform that we wore, despite the flag on us.”

Those experiences continued as he changed his uniform, he said.

“Many people did not see me as a police officer coming to their door to help them,” he said, “but they saw ‘the Black police officer.’ And I knew that oftentimes people didn’t remember my name, but they knew me as ‘the Black cop’ — not only in Portland, but also in surrounding towns.”

“I took on that responsibility of being the Black cop as a calling,” he said, “and pushed to make sure that Black, brown and all minorities were treated equally, as humans are expected to be. Despite often dealing with people at their worst, I felt they should be treated with dignity.”

Grant said that, while he never witnessed any direct racism among his all-white fellow offi-

cers, there were inevitable unconscious biases that sometimes crept into police work.

He recalled responding to a call for a teen party involving underage drinking at a white family’s house, and later to a similar scene at a Black family’s residence in the Chatham Court housing complex. At the white family’s house, he said, the kids were dispersed and the home’s owners made aware. At the Black family’s home, he said, calls were made for backup officers from neighboring towns, and officers were more “physically aggressive” with the partygoers, “want[ing] to put the kids in cuffs and take them into custody.”

Grant said he remembered speaking up: talking to his supervisor on behalf of the kids at that party in Chatham Court, and reminding him of how things had been handled at the other home. Grant said he asked to call the family who lived there and made sure they could “resolve the situation peacefully.”

“I took on my time as ‘the Black cop’ as an awesome responsibility to try to correct, even in a small way, the sometimes-correct portrayal of the racist cop. I tried treating people with patience and humility, no matter their race,” he said. “Yes, I’ve been the first Black police officer in the town of Portland, and in all these situations, I still felt blessed to have that responsibility. I owe these opportunities I have been given to the arduous struggles and the deaths of my Black people before and after Juneteenth.”

Former First Selectwoman Susan Bransfield, who was involved with the Committee on Solidarity’s Juneteenth Committee, described the event as a “rousing success,” and said that the date for next year’s event was already set for Saturday, June 19, 2027.

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State Funding Comes to Portland, East Hampton

Both Portland and East Hampton are celebrating recent public funding wins, with state grant money coming in to help support local projects.

In Portland, the town will receive \$634,800 from the Connecticut Department of Transportation's Community Connectivity Grant Program (CCGP), which, according to its website, "seeks to improve accommodations for bicyclists and pedestrians in urban, suburban and rural community centers."

"The goal of the CCGP is to make conditions safer and more accommodating for pedestrians and bicyclists, thereby encouraging more people to use these healthy and environmentally sustainable modes of travel," according to the site. "Making these improvements will make Connecticut's community centers more attractive places to live and work."

Portland First Selectman Mike Pelton said that the money would "go a long way to continue the work that we're doing on High Street near Valley View School, as well as our high school [and] middle school complex."

"At the end of the day," said Pelton, "we appreciate any State funding that allows us to improve our infrastructure and make it easier for our residents to walk, jog or ride their bikes around town. The best towns have the best connections!"

State Sen. Norm Needleman echoed Pelton's enthusiasm for the funding. Portland was one of three towns in his district, along with Essex and Deep River, to receive the DOT grant.

"These grants will pay a significant role in improving key downtown and town center, making them more accessible and spurring more local walkability," said Needleman.

In East Hampton, Needleman was celebrating another funding win, with the town receiving a \$250,000 brownfield remediation grant from the state Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP), to be used for cleaning up the town-owned property at 3 Walnut St. The 1.53-acre parcel, which is also known as the former water tower property, will eventually be

redeveloped into a public park.

The grant was awarded through DEEP's Brownfields into Greenfields (BIG) program, which relies on federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) CERCLA funding. The state program supports local municipalities in their efforts to remediate contaminated properties with the goal of using them as public green spaces, and East Hampton was one of four municipalities in the state to receive such funding this round. It received the largest grant out of the four.

"The BIG Grant Program allows DEEP to assist our municipal partners and non-profit organizations in their continuing efforts to turn brownfields that pose an environmental and economic burden into assets that make these communities better places to live, work and play," said DEEP Commissioner Katie Dykes.

The grant was the end result of a long process, said Brownfields Redevelopment Agency Chair Ryan Baldassario, who noted that the Brownfields Redevelopment Agency has been in existence for "over 20 years." This latest grant, he said, was possible in part thanks to previous funding that the town had received to assess the cleanup needs at this site and at several other town-owned Brownfield properties. It was also possible, he emphasized, due to the hard work and varying expertise of committee members.

"We have folks that have backgrounds in environmental science, in librarian work," he said. "I'm a university professional. We have folks that come from different walks of life that are helpful in taking different perspectives, reading the drafts and giving their two cents."

East Hampton Town Manager David Cox agreed, saying, "The East Hampton Brownfields Redevelopment Agency has really done great work moving these properties forward again. The members are the ones drafting these grant applications; truly relying on their experiences professionally and personally. While some of them are in the environmental area, others have education and research backgrounds that help round out the team."

Cox noted that the town and Brownfields Agency previously removed a water tower and structures on the site, and said that "the vision is to continue clean-up efforts at the property by tackling soils and, at some point, the sediments in the pond on the property to develop it into a multi-use amenity for the Village Center."

"The concept plans call for a park-like setting that can be used for small events with recreational seating in amphitheater style along the pond slope, paths along the Pocotopaug creek providing views of the historic brownstone dam, and a connection to the Air Line Trail through the Main Street parking lot via a bridge over the creek."

He noted that these concept plans are available to the public via the 2021 Village Center plan found at www.easthamptonct.gov/1285/Plans-Studies.

Though the Walnut Street property will eventually become a park, this round of funding will just get it started on that the journey. Baldassario said that the cleanup might take a year or so, because with any brownfield site, soil and materials that are cleaned up must be disposed of property by carefully chosen vendors.

Baldassario said that the agency and the town would likely seek future funding to finish trans-

forming the property into its finished form. He noted its ideal location for such a use.

"It's so connected to the village center, and right now it is kind of just underutilized," he said. "Right now you can go back there and see the creek and see this historic brownstone dam, but it's hard to get back there because it's all overgrown and underutilized."

"We're hoping to clean that up so that we can get better access to that waterway, so that the community has another space, another kind of pretty space to be in, to entice visitors, to allow folks to see the beauty of the town when they're coming from the Air Line Trail, and just to better use that space."

Baldassario emphasized that this wasn't the only town-owned brownfield property, so the Brownfields Agency's work would continue to assess, clean up and redevelop the other remaining properties as well. He said that the agency was looking to involve the public with meetings and informative online resources this fall.

Needleman said he was hopeful for the project's future.

"I'm encouraged by DEEP's support of our community and am grateful to state leaders for their support," he said. "I'll be watching with interest as work continues here."

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Local AARP Chapter Celebrates 40 Years

Colchester Area AARP Chapter 4019 celebrated its 40th anniversary on June 2 with a festive luncheon at Papa Z's Restaurant and Pizza. The anniversary luncheon was filled with food, friendship, memories and a look toward the future as members reflected on four decades of community involvement.

The chapter was officially formed in 1986 after receiving approval from the national AARP organization. Watson discovered the anniversary while reviewing historical paperwork earlier this year. "I was going through some paperwork a few months ago when I saw that the summer of 1986 was when they were officially created," she said.

While many people are familiar with AARP through mailings, insurance programs and national advocacy efforts, Watson said local chapters serve a very different purpose. "Whenever we try to talk to people in Colchester about our AARP group, they always say, 'Oh, we belong to AARP,'" Watson laughed. "That's true. You do. ... But we're not the same. It's like, no, we will not send you stuff in the mail."

Instead, the Colchester Area chapter focuses on bringing people together, providing information and supporting the local community. "We're a local group," Watson explained. "We're trying to get together as local people to work together and socialize together."

Despite its name, membership is not limited to Colchester residents. The chapter welcomes people from surrounding communities including Hebron, Lebanon, Salem, Norwich and beyond. "Anybody is welcome to join," Watson said. "You just have to kind of live in our general geographic area."

The chapter currently charges annual dues of \$10 which help cover operating expenses. Any excess funds are often donated back into the community.

"We usually donate it back to the community," Watson said. "When the senior center was a project that hadn't been built yet, we tended to donate our money towards the senior center. Now we may go back to helping people with the food bank, or a fuel bank."

Over the years, the chapter has adapted to changing needs among older adults. When the organization first formed, senior centers were still relatively new. Local AARP chapters often served as an important source of information about issues affecting seniors.

"People in the community saw a need for a group that would get information out to seniors and advocate for them," Watson said. "They wanted to make sure that people understood about Medicare or the kind of laws that were coming up that may affect them."

Today, senior centers, local commissions and other organizations provide many of those same

services. As a result, Watson said she believes local chapters are evolving.

"I'm kind of looking at the local chapters like mine and they're going through a kind of transition," she said. "Do members want to socialize more? Do they want to have more meetings where we have food? Do they have to have programs?"

To better understand what members want, Watson recently distributed surveys. "I think the point of AARP right now is to try and be flexible and do programming that appeals to the membership," she said. "As long as we stay within the general mission of helping seniors."

One challenge facing the chapter is attracting younger retirees and future leaders.

"If you're a 50-year-old senior, you're probably still working, and you're not going to come to a daytime week meeting," Watson said. "But then if I move them to the evening, my older seniors aren't going to come out because a lot of them don't like to drive at night."

She also noted that leadership recruitment has become increasingly difficult. "It's harder to get people to want to be on a board," she said. "There's nobody in the current group that is really chomping at the bit to do it."

Still, the chapter remains active. Members regularly host educational programs, candidate forums and social events throughout the year. One tradition Watson is especially proud of is inviting political candidates to speak. "We always invite candidates from both parties," she said. "Our opinion is we have to be bipartisan."

The chapter's longest-serving members continue to provide inspiration. Among those attending the anniversary celebration was Goldie Limerant, who will celebrate her 100th birthday in July. Watson described Limerant as a "town fixture," and noted her decades of involvement with local organizations and community service.

Limerant estimated she joined the chapter more than 35 years ago. "Because I'm a joiner," she laughed when asked why she became involved. "I volunteer."

When asked what changes she has seen since first joining, Limerant pointed to declining participation. "I think there are fewer members now than there were back then," she said. She believes modern lifestyles play a role.

"Well, I think nowadays, people really don't get involved," Limerant said. "There're too many other things that they can be doing."

For Limerant, however, the organization still holds much value. When asked what she enjoys most about attending meetings, she answered, "Retaining old friendships." She added that the chapter has provided "an opportunity to meet some people" and stay connected to the community.

That sense of friendship and connection was abundant throughout the evening as members

ate and laughed with one another, played a historical-theme bingo game and installed officers for another year of service.

Watson, who has been involved with the organization for roughly 15 years, said the chapter continues to enrich her life. "I like the fact that it's generally a nice social gathering," she said. "There's

been a lot of really nice people in the AARP?"

After 40 years, the local focus on service, friendship and community remains the heart of the organization. "We should always try to be flexible enough to do what people want," Watson said. "That's what the group is. It's made up of the members."

From the First Selectman's Desk

I want to provide Colchester residents an update on the latest developments as Colchester prepares for a second budget referendum.

Last week, the Colchester Board of Finance voted to make reductions totaling \$1,667,890 to the combined town and Board of Education budgets and to recommend sending the budgets back to referendum – likely to take place on Tuesday, July 28.

These cuts represent the largest combined cuts after a failed referendum since at least 2010.

In debating cuts, the Board of Finance agreed on bringing the proposed mill rate below the current rate of inflation.

The new proposed mill rate is 30.97 - an increase of 1.05 mills (3.5%). To the average residential homeowner, this represents a monthly impact of about \$18.

The Board of Finance made cuts to all major town departments for a total town reduction of \$167,890. Town cuts include

- Unpaid furlough days for all elected officials — including the first selectman, department heads, and administrators' union

- Elimination of a seasonal grounds maintainer for parks, trails, and town facilities
- Elimination of a part-time custodian
- Elimination of part-time hours for the Land Use Office
- Elimination of the free public sand/salt pile at Public Works
- Cuts to road paving budget
- Cuts to tree removal budget

Various smaller cuts were made to department supplies, software, other miscellaneous items throughout the town department budgets.

Based on public feedback, these cuts do not currently impact hours at Cragin Library or the fire department staffing plan as previously discussed.

On the Board of Education side, the Board of Finance voted to reduce the BOE budget by \$1.5 million.

At the \$1.5 million level, likely impacts include:

- Eliminate assistant principal at Bacon Academy
- JJIS/CES to share one principal
- Some office professionals reduced to 10-month work-year
- BOE Finance Department staff reduction as part of merger with Town Finance Department
- Elimination of library media specialist, paraeducator, therapist, and multilingual learner teacher

- Teacher furlough days

Band and sports at WJJMS and JJIS are not expected to be impacted at the \$1.5 million cut level.

The Board of Education also voted to begin reintegration of their finance department with the town finance department. I believe this is a critical step that will help restore shared oversight, enhance our long-term planning and coordination, and reduce administrative overhead.

Based on the tentative budget calendar, a town Meeting on the revised proposal will likely take place on Wednesday, July 15; absentee ballots would become available the next day. The referendum will likely take place Tuesday, July 28. The Board of Selectmen will meet to officially schedule dates soon.

Tax bills using last year's adopted mill rate will be mailed out for July 1 (last day to pay Aug. 3, 2026) for all property types (first installment of real estate, motor vehicle, and personal property). In recent years, the town has only sent out real estate bills before budget adoption but state OPM is now advising towns to bill all property types together unless a specific Charter provision authorizes the town to do separate billing. Supplemental bills will be mailed after budget adoption if necessary.

Acting Superintendent Judy O'Meara and I are Colchester residents and taxpayers as well. We know that every decision – whether it is a cut or an increase – impacts our community, our schools, and our neighbors. We will continue working with our respective boards and fellow residents to implement realistic budgets that deliver services residents, students, and families rely upon, while also taking into account the affordability challenges many people are facing in their homes due to the rising costs of gas, electricity, groceries, and more.

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Proposed School Budget Reduced by \$1.5 Million

Colchester's next budget referendum date is tentatively set, after the Board of Finance last week voted to reduce the overall town spending package by more than \$1.5 million.

Members of the boards of finance, education and selectmen all met last week to discuss how to arrive at budgets for the town and school that would pass muster with voters at referendum. Later in the week, on June 18, the finance board then met and approved a \$1.5 million reduction to the Board of Education's proposed 2026-27 budget, setting it at a total of \$49.36 million, a 4.4% increase over current year spending.

The board also approved a reduction of around \$168,000 on the proposed town operations budget, bringing it to \$19.04 million, a 5.3% increase. Officials noted that a town meeting will be the next step, followed by a tentative July 28 referendum.

BOF Chair Karen Belding, a Democrat, opened the meeting by explaining how much the budget proposals have been reduced since first presented in March. She said the original proposals would have produced a 33.5 mill tax rate and an 11.9% increase.

After reductions and additional state aid, the proposed tax increase dropped considerably. The current plan leads with a proposed mill rate of 30.97, a 3.5% increase.

School leaders then warned that the district has already made painful cuts. Acting Superintendent of Schools Judy O'Meara said the largest reason for this year's increase is the need to rebuild the health insurance reserve fund after it had fallen almost to depletion.

"These reductions result in more than \$1 million in cuts to operational spending when compared to the fiscal year 2025-26 budget," O'Meara said. "These reductions affect staffing programs, services and resources that directly

support students and schools."

Assistant Superintendent of Schools Jessica Kuckel said the district had already identified more than \$2 million in savings through retirements, vacancies and restructuring. Those reductions included eliminating positions such as a speech language pathologist, literacy coach, social worker and several classroom jobs.

She warned that additional cuts would mean fewer course sections and reduced access to Advanced Placement classes.

At the \$1.5 million reduction level, which the BOF approved at the June 18 meeting, O'Meara said administrative cuts would include eliminating the Bacon Academy assistant principal position and not filling the interim principal position at Colchester Elementary School. Other positions to be eliminated included a library media specialist, paraeducator, therapist and a math teacher. Professional development, supplies, books, technology upgrades and maintenance projects would also be reduced.

"At the \$1.5 million level, students continue to receive a comprehensive educational program, but schools operate with fewer resources, fewer support systems and less flexibility to respond to students' needs," said O'Meara.

First Selectman Bernie Dennler, a Democrat, explained that the town side of the budget was built with a few new initiatives and no new capital projects. Wages and benefits account for roughly 60% of the budget. Employee benefits alone rose by about \$500,000, while health insurance costs increased by roughly \$460,000.

Dennler shared that his office had already proposed about \$160,000 in cuts, including furlough days for department heads, reduced office supplies, cuts to road work and eliminating a seasonal grounds position. "I don't have a lot of runway left to go to," Dennler said, "without

starting to disrupt services."

Students, Staff Warn Against Cuts

The school system's music programs were largely left alone in the latest round of budget reductions – but parents and students alike appeared aware that might not be the case if the school budget proposed increase were trimmed any further.

Aaron Brown, a parent and music teacher, warned that cutting music programs would hurt students.

"Music is not a luxury, it's a necessity," said Brown. "Band and choir routinely teach grit, growth, mindset and collaboration."

Bacon Academy senior Keegan McKenzie reminded adults that students do not vote. "These kids have not yet finished," she said. "They do not have a vote; they do not have a voice. Their future is in the hands of all of the adults here and in this town."

Recent Bacon graduate Gianna Riley credited the band program with helping her reach college. "Without Bacon's band program, I would not be able to attend the college I have chosen this fall," she said.

Meanwhile, math teacher Jennifer Emery described the emotional strain facing educators.

"Today was a really hard day at work," Emery said at the June 18 meeting. "I sat with colleagues of mine with tears in their eyes because they were told that there's a possibility that they are not going to be employed come August."

She noted that teachers had agreed to fur-

lough days and called for limiting cuts.

"Every day that passes without a resolution, we're increasing the likelihood of losing some of the best teachers that I know," said Emery.

Still, some residents argued that the proposed budgets remain too high. Jeff Mattson said voters had already sent a message when they overwhelmingly rejected both the town and school budgets at referendum last month. On May 20, voters shot down a proposed \$50.87 million Board of Education budget, which would have been a 7.5% increase from current year spending, and also rejected a proposed \$19.52 million town operations budget, which would have been a 7.9% increase.

"I think you need to do the right thing and get us a budget that's no more than a 3% increase," Mattson said last week.

Merging Finance Departments

Another major topic at last week's meeting involved merging the town and school finance departments. Dennler said discussions were already underway.

"It takes two to tango," he said. "The Board of Selectmen cannot impose this on the Board of Education."

He added, "We think that there may be some savings, but ultimately the larger savings in my opinion comes from having a model that is more financially sound."

The BOE ultimately motioned to initiate the reintegration of the finance departments for the town and BOE, which passed unanimously.

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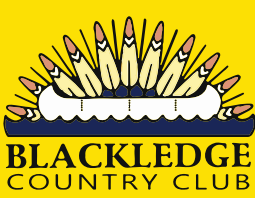

40 minutes, which we felt is a good time period, especially if a parent is commuting to work or perhaps they're going for a walk," she said. "It's a short enough time that [it] doesn't seem too long, but a long enough time where we can really pack some good information."

The first two episodes were released during Mental Health Awareness Month in May and focused on youth mental health. Both featured AHM clinicians. Additional episodes released in June focus on substance use and include guests from Amplify, AHM's regional behavioral health action organization.

Future episodes are already in the works. Giordano said topics involving technology are especially important right now.

"We definitely, over the summer, want to approach topics around social media and phones, devices, AI," she said. "Those are topics that we know, just from interacting with our families at the office, that those are very much hot topics right now."

AHM also plans an episode focused on helping students transition back to school after summer vacation.

"We know for some youth that that's a point which can be a little bit anxiety-driven," Giordano explained. "So we want to give parents tips on how to transition your child back into the routine and the structure of school."

She added with a laugh, "There is not going to be a shortage of topics for sure."

Beyond sharing information, the podcast also introduces families to local resources.

“Whatever topic we’re discussing, we want to give some factual information, but then perhaps provide families with local resources – where to turn to if this is a challenge that maybe you’re seeing in your child,” she said.

She hopes families who listen will feel comfortable reaching out. “They know that we’re friendly, we’re approachable and we’re right around the corner.”

Giordano added she believes the topics discussed are relevant far beyond the four towns AHM serves.

“Our country is experiencing a youth mental health crisis. That’s universal,” she said. “When we’re talking about substance use and addiction, those are topics that if you go anywhere, youth are exposed to and struggling with.”

The first episodes have already received strong engagement. In addition to full episodes, AHM shares clips and highlights across Instagram, Facebook, TikTok and more.

“We really feel that any information that parents are picking up is helpful,” Giordano said.

As the youth service bureau for the four towns, AHM provides outpatient counseling, school-based support, family resource centers, prevention programs and positive youth activities. The organization serves children from birth through age 26 and helps about 12,000 residents each year.

“We really try to go where the people are, to be able to give information, create connections and just be present within the community,” Giordano said.

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Young Soccer Star Jetting to France

Nolan Quealy, a 10-year-old from East Hampton, will soon have the opportunity to train with and compete against the top soccer talent from across the world.

Quealy has been selected for the highly-competitive Paris Saint-Germain (PSG) Academy Pro Top 44 Program, an elite international soccer development held in France.

“I’m very happy and excited,” stated Quealy, who added that he is most looking forward to learning from the PSG coaches and training with other kids from different countries.

Quealy was identified for the program following his participation in the PSG Academy Pro Summer Program at Oak Hill Academy in Virginia during the summer of 2025. Throughout the week-long training experience, players were evaluated by PSG Academy Pro coaches and staff using the same developmental principles employed throughout the PSG Academy network.

Following the evaluation process, Quealy was selected to participate in the PSG Academy Pro Top 44 Program, one of the most prestigious opportunities available within the global PSG Academy network.

The invitation-only program brings together the highest-rated young players identified through PSG Academy Pro events around the world and provides them with an immersive training experience at the academy’s elite training facilities in France.

Training with PSG is the next step in Quealy’s

quest to become a more polished player.

It’s a passion for Quealy that has grown over the years, but it was not love at first kick.

When his parents first signed him up for town soccer in preschool, his father, Jonathan Queally, said “he hated every second of it” and that he did not make it through the initial season.

But after taking a year off, the young prodigy asked to give it another try and a few years later he has earned the right to learn from the best of the best in the business.

Along with playing for the town, Quealy also plays travel soccer for East Hampton Soccer Club (EHSC). He joined CFC North for a few seasons before making the jump to Hartford Athletic Youth Academy, where he still plays today.

It was at the Hartford Youth Academy that the PSG Academy saw Quealy’s potential, noting the blossoming local talent, “distinguished himself through his intensity, technical ability, speed, and passion for the game.”

This will be his second time training in France, first visiting and playing in Paris for a week in October 2023 as part of a similar invitation-only program.

For his latest invite, the Quealys received an email before informing their son he was about to make a return to France.

“Nolan’s selection is a tremendous accomplishment and a reflection of the hard work, dedication, and passion he brings to the game every day,” stated his parents. “To be recognized among such a talented international group of

players is an incredible honor.”

More than 700 players from across North America, Europe, Asia, Africa, and the Middle East participated in PSG Academy Pro programs during the selection cycle. Time to License Your Dog

June is dog licensing month. All dogs 6 months or older require a license each year in the town where they reside. A current rabies certificate for all dogs, and a neutered/spayed certificate for first time licenses are required.

Dog license fees: neutered male/spayed female, \$8; unneutered male/spayed female, \$19; kennel licenses, 10 for \$50 plus 10 cents per tag, or 20 for \$100 plus .10 per tag. Late licensing penalty is \$1 per month after June, and fee is 50 cents to replace a lost tag.

Dog licenses may be obtained at the town clerk's office Monday, Wednesday and Thursday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.; Tuesday, 8 a.m. to 6:30 p.m.; and Friday, 8 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

Taxes Due

Taxes for real estate, personal property and motor vehicles levied on the Oct. 1, 2025 Grand List are due and payable on Wednesday, July 1. The final day to pay without penalty is Monday, Aug. 3. Real estate and personal property taxes totaling more than \$100, as well as motor vehicle taxes totaling more than \$500, may be paid in two equal installments.

Property owners are responsible for ensuring that all taxes are paid when due. Failure to receive a tax bill does not relieve the taxpayer of the responsibility to pay taxes owed, including any applicable interest charges for delinquent payments. If you did not receive your tax bill, please contact the Collector of Revenue at tax-collector@easthamptonct.gov.

Late payments accrue interest at a rate of

1.5% per month (18% annually) with a \$2 minimum interest charge, as required by state law. Payments legibly postmarked by the USPS on or before Aug. 3 are considered on time regardless of when they are received by the tax office.

Volunteers Changing Lives for Older People and People with Disabilities

It was almost three years ago when Teresa Shulman decided she had gazed out at the beautiful lake across the street from her home long enough.

“I decided that retirement is not for me,” said Shulman, who had been assistant finance director in East Hampton for years.

At the same time, she heard about East Hampton Community Cares – a program started locally by the East Hampton Commission on Aging that connects volunteers with older or disabled people who need help with transportation, grocery shopping, housework, yardwork, technology or who simply want someone to talk with.

So Shulman, 72, started volunteering – driving people who needed a ride to the doctor’s or to a food bank.

“I was hooked,” said Shulman, who grew up in a family and went to a school that stressed the importance of reaching out to those who are less fortunate. “It serves a purpose for those giving the benefits and those receiving the benefits. ... It makes me feel useful and helps me get out of my own head and into someone else’s head.”

Marilyn Gerzabek is one of those people that Shulman is helping. Gerzabek, 92, lives on her own in East Hampton and stopped driving a few years ago.

She has children and grandchildren who can help but they would have to take time off from work to drive her to doctor’s appointments – not something Gerzabek wants to ask them to do.

“It has worked beautifully,” said Gerzabek of getting rides with Shulman. “She is a lovely lady.”

And with all the drives together, the two have become friends, which often happens.

“Marilyn is sharper than I am,” said Shulman. “I’ll ask, Marilyn, what is this about? And she fills you right in.”

Eric Rosenberg, chairman of the East Hampton Commission on Aging, said the program, which was started with the help of UR Community Cares in Manchester, has 119 people participating: 48 volunteers helping out and 71 members requesting help.

Rosenberg said recently that during the last 120 days ending in May, 68 deeds – as each task is called – were done. The annualized rate is 207 deeds per year or more than one every two days.

While the program is strong, Rosenberg is certain there are more older adults in East Hampton who could use help. In the commission’s survey of the town’s older adults, one third of those who responded said they could use help maintaining their home or doing yard work. Of those with lower incomes or age 80 and older, a third had trouble getting transportation to medical appointments.

Rosenberg said that providing these services to older or disabled people helps them “to live at home and gives them a sense of community – a sense that other people care about them and are willing to help them out.

“It’s a great asset to the whole community,”

said Rosenberg.

Shulman has done 151 deeds – the most of any volunteer. Last summer, she was honored along with several other top volunteers by the commission with a Bevin Bell and a proclamation for her efforts.

Lois Caron is another East Hampton resident who has benefited from Shulman’s help. When Caron, 81, lost her husband four years ago, she hadn’t driven in 30 years.

In addition, she had a sprawling yard that needed to be mowed. Her husband’s rider-lawn mower was in her shed.

“I can’t do any of this myself,” she said recently. “I don’t dare get on that lawn mower.”

One of her nieces found out about East Hampton Community Cares and Caron hit it off with Shulman, who helps her out with rides. “She’s great! We even went out to dinner together. She’s something – she really is. She’s very reliable.”

And meanwhile Caron has gotten help from EHCC with her lawn. On a recent very hot afternoon, Steve Steele, a volunteer, was mowing her lawn.

A retired high school math teacher, Steele said he’s one “of those crazy people who loves yardwork.”

Besides, he said, when he found out that Caron owned a riding lawn mower, it was “a win/win for both of us!”

Steve Krupp, a former high school special education teacher in East Hampton, said EHCC said is his favorite volunteer program because of its flexibility and ease.

Volunteers sign up with the statewide, parent group called UR Community Cares which provides an on-line portal so that East Hampton volunteers can see who in town needs help with what and when. The program is open to all, regardless of income.

“It’s very convenient,” said Krupp. “You get to pick what you want. You pick and choose what you are comfortable doing each week.”

From the State Senator’s Desk...

Investing In Connecticut Families

At a time when more households are watching budgets and spending carefully, we’re at a point where our state needs to step in and make sure our residents are being taken care of. I’m proud that Connecticut is stepping up, with two significant investments in programs aiding people around the state the latest evidence of that fact.

At the beginning of June, Governor Lamont announced the state’s investment of \$320 million into the Early Childhood Education Endowment. Created last year, the Endowment, now worth \$620 million, is designed to ensure no Connecticut family pays more than 7% of its income on child care, acknowledging the rapidly increasing cost of infant-to-kindergarten programs and strain faced by families and providers alike.

Under child care programs participating in the Endowment, once it reaches full steam in July 2027, families earning under \$100,000 per year will pay \$0 for child care, and anyone earning above \$100,000 will pay no more than 7% of their earnings – meaning a family earning \$200,000 would see costs capped at \$14,000. That’s a huge way to support young families and better ensure every child in our communities is given a chance to succeed from their earliest days.

In addition, the Endowment is working to support the expansion of child care providers, with the goal of creating thousands of additional spaces and financially supporting providers themselves in a competitive industry. It has a full board of advisors overseeing its activities as well, who will make sure it remains both financially solvent and focused on supporting the children of Connecticut.

That’s not all, either. In 2024, the legislature worked with Governor Lamont to approve the use of \$6.5 million in leftover American Rescue Plan Funding, received during the pandemic, toward reducing medical debt among Connecticut residents. Two years later, Governor Lamont just announced that without spending all of that \$6.5 million sum, the state has canceled medical debt for more than 252,000 residents, with more than \$513 million in debt automatically canceled.

That means more than 5% of the state’s population has received debt relief averaging more than \$2,000 per person, removing significant burdens from their finances.

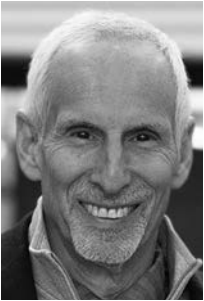
Under the initiative, the state works with a nonprofit, Undue Medical Debt, to purchase up bulk portfolios of qualifying medical debt owed by Connecticut patients. Anyone earning at or below 400% of the federal poverty level, or \$132,000 for a family of four, or with medical debt exceeding 5% of their income is eligible. The debts are acquired in large packages and can be bought for fractions of their actual value, allowing for low-cost debt relief.

Residents who received debt relief will be notified by mail; no one can apply for or request relief, but it can be delivered for countless residents, with money left to be spent before it expires.

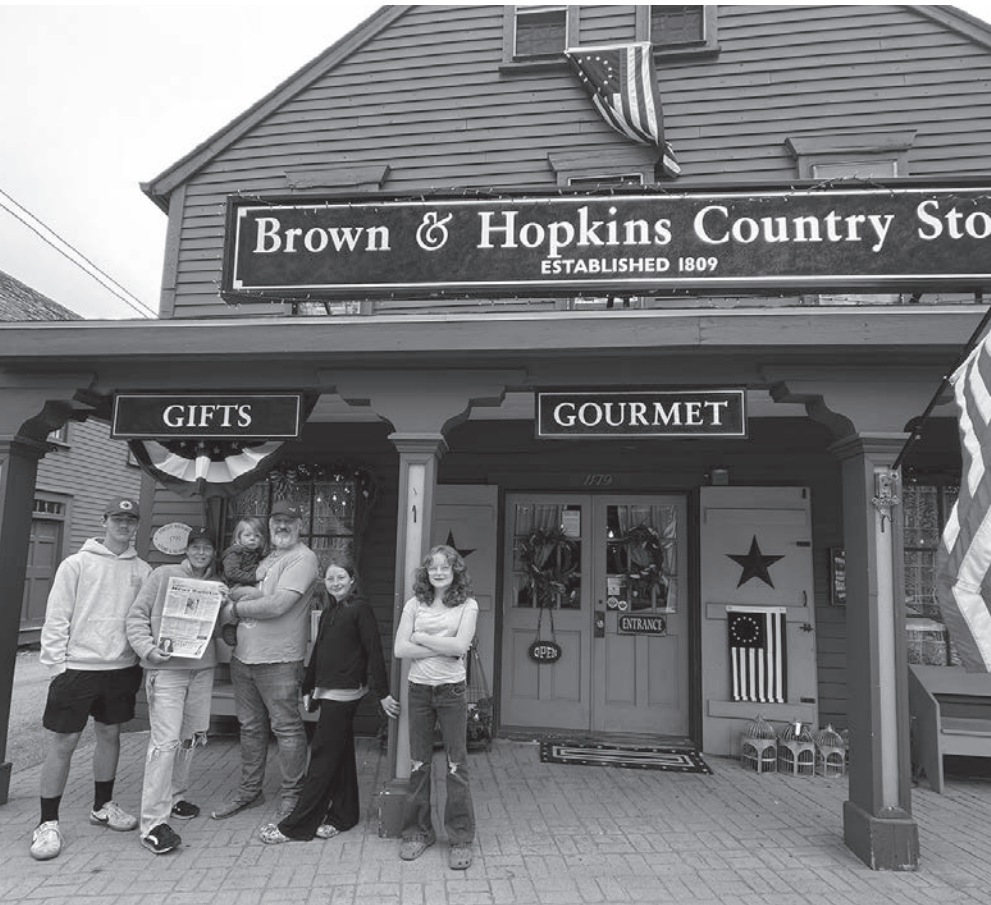
Affordability remains a serious issue throughout our communities, but Connecticut is working to respond and meet people where they are. Making child care more affordable and erasing medical debt will pay strong dividends in our communities for years to come.

Nourish Hebron

To the Editor:

On June 17, Hebron's Planning and Zoning Commission held an informal meeting where the public could discuss their ideas for Hebron Center. A good crowd showed up and ideas were freely exchanged. One person suggested a community center, another, for music lovers, a 1980s-style “ma and pa” record store. A third idea is to build a Nature/Visitors Center. And a fourth, to preserve 17 Kinney Rd. (old Horton land) by putting this property into Hebron's Open Space program. Saving the property allows it to be utilized much like the Raymond Brook Park is now utilized. Thanks to many generations before us, the property lends itself perfectly to this frugal idea. An idea so simple and inexpensive it might just be ignored.

For years now, Hebron has wanted to connect their trail system to downtown. Through low impact updates, the existing farm road and historic laneways, could easily extend the trail from the Raymond Brook Park to a vacant lot at Pendleton Drive. Quite recently, Hebron's Town Council purchased this lot. By carefully combining the laneways and tractor path on 17 Kinney, we can connect to Hebron Center while still allowing our farmers to farm, our trees to flourish and our wetlands to remain productive. Aside from a couple sensitive areas, the farm road and laneways are uncomplicated. Once fully cleared, the laneways themselves create the option for a longer hike. The vacant lot at Pendleton is a great spot for a Nature/Visitors Center and a basic greenhouse for community gardening and growing food, possibly for the food bank. As it now stands, when residents purchase groceries for Hebron's food bank, the food must be packaged or canned. Fresh vegetables might be a welcome addition.

Rumor has it there are empty storefronts on Pendleton Drive, so the record store could also have a home. Additionally, perhaps the Pendleton lot could house the outdoor parties people seem to want. This leaves 17 Kinney to safely filter groundwaters, grow trees, harbor historic artifacts and support our famers as they continue feeding all of us. Do note: basic starter green houses can be made inexpensively out of hoop frames and heavy clear plastic sheets. We can update as donations come in, provided this is a popular option. Obituaries

Portland

Alfred Grover Reylek
8/28/1930 – 6/1/2026

Alfred was born in Sayville, Long Island, New York, the youngest of seven siblings. Al grew up with a love of animals and watching the skies for airplanes. He owned his first airplane before his first automobile and got his pilot's license and license to teach.



After high school, Al served in both the Army and Air Force. He later settled in New Jersey and raised German Shepherds and showed them, winning many blue ribbons. He also took up horseback riding and competing in jumping, again winning many blue ribbons.

Al's and his first wife Louise built a farm in New Jersey. Al started skeet shooting, collecting rifles, and many other endeavors. The Reyleks became antique dealers. Al began flying with the Flying Tigers and joined United Airlines. He also rode with the Essex Fox Hounds with Jackie Kennedy.

Their collection of primitives became extensive, and when they could not find the perfect old house, they built a reproduction in Lyme. It had a horse barn and massive gardens. Al kept small planes at Goodspeed.

His first wife died young of lung cancer. About that time, he became acquainted with Priscilla Jackson Amenta, who had a local antique shop at Cold Spring Farm. Priscilla and Louise became friends, as Louise had a shop at Tom Roses. Rattebury Farm at Hadlyme Four Corners.

Tom was a dear friend and great folk-art painter. The Reyleks and the Amentas both had many pieces featuring animals. Priscilla never met Al until Louise's death, as he was always off on a trip, based out of Newark, N.J.

Al had no children by choice and Priscilla had two grown sons. Al bonded well with Priscilla's sons; George helped build many stone walls on Al's properties and Tony joining Al with collecting guns and skeet shooting.

Al retired at age 60, mandatory by United. Priscilla went on his commercial last night a red eye from San Fran. He wanted no fanfare but upon landing was greeted by many of the top officials from United.

Al and Priscilla started world travels with a trip to London on the Concord, returning to New York on the Queen Elizabeth II first class. It was a rough voyage as the captain didn't have the stabilizers out.

It was time to move into an older house in Cape Cod at Quivet Neck in East Dennis, Mass. It was built in 1783 and was in need of major reconstruction. The Reyleks also added a three bay Cape Cod barn to house Al's growing collection of hand-crafted toy airplanes. Al became very involved in Old Kings Highway, trying to save Cape Cod from developers. He was also the president of Homeowners Association.

The Reyleks were avid entertainers and enjoyed gourmet food and fine wines.

The Cape became crowded and Vermont had a calling. They bought 26 acres of land in Waitsfield along with the Captain Hallet house, 1862 from Hyannis and had it shipped to Vermont. It took over a year to rebuild. The Reyleks still had their Cape Cod Airedales and Al was collecting

more planes, China and much more. Both Priscilla's sons and their significant others lived close by. After several years Al felt he could no longer do the yard work and would not hire anyone; they bought a townhouse in Middlebury. It had beautiful gardens and was backed up to many walking trails. Al served on the Board of Directors and was grounds chairman for many years. The Airedales were gone but along came Sarah, a Wesla.

The Reyleks continued to travel; East Africa, the Amazon, climbing Machu Pichu, Egypt, Jordan, South Africa, Cambodia, and Vietnam to name a few adventures. They also went on many Viking cruises and on the Oceania, dining with Jacque Pepic, whom they knew from Connecticut. Air Museum, a special gathering. Barcelona to Turkey via the Panama Canal. One last was a trip to Cuba!

Al's health started with issues. The Reyleks moved to a cottage at "The Residence at Otter Creek," Middlebury. It was a rental with meals included. Priscilla thought this was adequate forever. It had a yard with a fence, and it had been upgraded to make it look old. They put in gardens and new brick paths. The birdhouses went up and bluebirds moved in. It overlooked a marsh, with easy walking to the main building.

Al was not happy, although he walked daily with a walker and enjoyed happy hour at the main building.

Time to go back to Connecticut. Priscilla and son George settled on Bartlett Hill. Several longtime friends were residents. Priscilla had lived in Portland for a few years when her sons were young. The move took place along with two rescue cats and now began trying to make the house look early. Al had basically sold his airplane collection at auction and much more.

Al is remembered pushing his walker up and down hills, still looking forward to going out to lunch and long drives. Finally, after breaking his hip, Al settled in at Portland Rehab, easy for Priscilla to visit as close by.

On June 1, 2026, Priscilla heard a small aircraft hovering over the house. Went out to see a small aircraft, bright blue and white, circling above the house. It dipped its wings and flew due north.

Al is survived by his beloved niece Nancy and her husband Tom Sokolski; his wife, Priscilla Jackson Reylek, of 35 years; his stepson, George Amenta of Portland; his daughter-in-law Margaret McGrath of Waitsfield, Vt.; and the Jackson family. He is also survived by many good friends.

He is predeceased by his entire family, his much-loved stepson, Anthony T. Amenta, and granddaughter, Ellie Ann Amenta.

The family would like to extend special acknowledgment to the staff of Portland Care and Rehabilitation Center for Al's excellent care, encouragement, and kindness.

A pink dogwood will be planted at Portland Care in Al's memory.
